3. Noise Nuisance

Refrigeration equipment, pumps, compressors and mechanical ventilation systems must be located, designed, installed and maintained to achieve a maximum noise level of 3dB(A) above background levels as measured from noise sensitive locations and a maximum noise level of 8dB(A) above background levels as measured from commercial locations.

Screening is required to be installed and maintained to all air conditioning, lift motor rooms, plant and service facilities located at the top of, or on the external face of buildings. The screening structures must be constructed from materials that are consistent with materials used elsewhere on the facade of the building. There are to be no individual external unscreened air conditioning units attached to the exterior building facades.

Reason: To ensure the development does not have a detrimental effect on the amenity of the surrounding land in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

4. Infrastructure

The applicant / developer is responsible for the cost of necessary alterations to existing public utility mains, services or installations required by works in relation to the proposed development or any works required by condition(s) of this approval.

All works must be designed, constructed and carried out in accordance with FNQROC Development Manual requirements (as amended) and to the satisfaction of Council's Chief Executive Officer.

Reason: To ensure the development does not have a detrimental effect on the amenity of the surrounding land in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

5. Access

The applicant/developer must:

- a. Engage a suitably qualified engineer to confirm the access driveways are suitably located providing safe and efficient access to the site, and provide written confirmation to the satisfaction of Council's Chief Executive Officer; and
- b. Construct commercial access crossovers in the locations shown on the approved plans, except where modified by item a. above.

6. Parking/Internal Driveways

The applicant/developer must provide a minimum of 16 on-site parking spaces, including 1 PWD space and 1 emergency vehicle bay.

All spaces must be sealed, line-marked and appropriately drained and designed in accordance with Australian Standard AS2890:1 Off Street Parking – Car Parking and Australian Standard AS2890.6-2009 Off-street parking for people with disabilities as applicable.

All car parking facilities must be maintained to a safe operating standard at all times thereafter.

Reason: To provide development with parking in accordance with council standards.

7. Stormwater Drainage

The applicant/developer must:

- a. Take all necessary steps to ensure a non-worsening effect on surrounding land as a consequence of the development; and
- b. Ensure development is undertaken in accordance with the approved Stormwater Management Plan SKC01 and supporting material, prepared by STP Consultants in particular:
 - Stormwater management must meet or exceed the standards of design and construction set out in the Queensland Urban Drainage Manual (QUDM) and the FNQROC Development Manual to the satisfaction of Council's Chief Executive Officer; and
 - ii. Erosion and Sediment Control Plan must that meet or exceed the Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Guidelines (Institute of Engineers Australia) to the satisfaction of Chief Executive Officer.

Reasons: To convey stormwater legally and in an environmentally responsible manner and to manage and minimise the risk of causing environmental harm to receiving waters, damage to council infrastructure, and unnecessary financial burdens to council and the community in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

8. Landscaping

The landscaping of the site must be carried out generally accordance with the landscaping shown on the Proposed Site Plan (SD02 rev 7), and irrigated, mulched and maintained to the satisfaction of Council's Chief Executive Officer.

a. Outdoor lighting must be designed, located and installed to prevent light spillage to cause nuisance to neighbours and must be provided in accordance with Australian Standard 1158.1 – Lighting for Roads and Public Spaces.

Illumination resulting from direct, reflected or other incidental light emanating from the subject land does not exceed 8 lux when measured at any point 1.5m outside the property boundary of the subject site. The lighting fixtures installed on site must meet appropriate lux levels as documented within Australian Standard 4282 – Control of the Obtrusive Effects of Outdoor Lighting.

Reason: To ensure that the use does not cause a light nuisance to nearby sensitive receptors, and to ensure that a nuisance is not caused to the use from other nearby light sources in accordance with the Queensland Environmental Protection Act 1994 Section 440.

10. Water Supply

Prior to the water service connection works commencing, a request for a Plumbing Connection is required to be submitted with detailed hydraulic drawings. The connection must be approved by Council prior to the property connection work being undertaken.

Reason: To ensure that the premises is appropriately serviced by reticulated water supply infrastructure in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

11. Sewerage Connection

Prior to the issue of a Building Approval

The development must connect to Council's reticulated sewerage system in accordance with FNQROC Development Manual standards (as amended) to the satisfaction of Council's Chief Executive Officer.

Prior to the property connection to the existing sewer main, a request for a Property Connection must be lodged with Council's Chief Executive Officer. The connection must be approved by Council prior to the property connection work being undertaken.

Reason: To ensure that the premises are appropriately serviced by Council infrastructure where located in a service area for a sewerage service in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

12. Minimum Floor Levels

Floor levels must achieve immunity from flood hazards by ensuring floor levels for new buildings or structures (other than Class 10 Buildings and Structures) achieve a finished floor level of 12.14m AHD.

Prior to the issue of a Development Permit for Building Works

Note: the draft drainage study forming part of the Yarrabah Masterplan 2021 provides guidance on flood depth. The site is mapped with an indicative flood depth of 0.5-1.0 m across the site and identifies a maximum flood level of 11.17 to 12.81. Applying a maximum flood depth of 1m from the lowest level of the site of 10.84 m AHD (south eastern corner), a finished floor level 12.14 m AHD is required (11.84 plus 300mm).

Reason: To ensure developments are appropriately immune from rising storm tide /flood water in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

13. Bushfire Management

The Gindaja Treatment and Healing Centre Business Continuity Plan shall be reviewed and updated as necessary to addresses actions to be undertaken during a bushfire event.

Reason: To protect development from bushfire hazards in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

14. Acid Sulphate Soils Management

Development does not disturb acid sulfate soils or potential acid sulfate soils. Where disturbance is unavoidable an acid sulfate soils investigation is to be conducted. Should the soils and groundwater investigations reveal the presence of acid sulphate soils or potential acid sulphate soils, an Acid Sulphate Soils Management Plan must be prepared and complied with.

Reason: To ensure potential adverse impacts on the natural and built environment, including infrastructure and human health as a result of acid sulphate soils are avoided in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

15. Refuse Facilities

The waste storage area is to be of sufficient size to house all garbage bins including recycling bins. The waste storage is to be suitably paved, with a hose cock fitted in close proximity to the enclosure and drain to sewer via a legal sewer connection.

Where the refuse truck must enter the site for waste collection, access roads and driveways must be designed and constructed to accept vehicle loadings of not less that G.V.M 33 tonnes.

Reason: to ensure protection of matters of public health and amenity in accordance with relevant code/s and policy direction.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

Council should note that water in our reticulation system remains within safe drinking guidelines and is routinely inspected. Cause of issues is under ongoing investigation and initial cause is believed to be caused by stagnant water in pipes in the respective facilities.
- <u>CoastAdapt for Queensland coastal</u>, Webinar Wednesday 31 May upgrade of content for CoastAdapt .
- FNQ RRTG Meeting Thursday 1 June in Cairns.

GOVERNANCE:

The budget for the new financial year has provision for a Governance & Grants Officer. Once the budget is confirmed by the Council, recruitment process will commence.

GRANT MANAGEMENT

GRANTS APPLIED

- Federal Governments Regional Connectivity Program \$ 670,476 In conjunction with NBN to provide Fixed Wireless Internet to Yarrabah, reducing blackspots and improving download and upload speeds. Reducing reliance on cell phone connections and replacing the ageing ADSL infrastructure.
- Queensland Arts Showcase Program GROW Round 2 \$70,000

Jabu Birriny 2023 showcasing Yarrabah Arts and Culture project will inject new works to showcase at the Jabu Birriny annual exhibition to coincide with the Yarrabah Music and Cultural Festival.

GRANTS APPROVED DURING PERIOD

- **SES 2023-24 Support Grant \$30,000** The aim of the Program is to provide financial assistance to Local Governments enabling the SES to respond to disasters and emergencies. Funding for the acquisition or replacement of suitable new and second-hand vehicles.
- Queensland State Government Microgrid Pilot Fund \$720,000 to support stage 1. Of the Yarrabah Microgrid. The microgrid in expected to provide 18 FTF jobs per year, an annual income stream to Council estimated at \$750,000 per year and annual household savings of \$1.7 million per annum across the community.
- NAIDOC Week Grant \$1,000 Towards Councils Community Event and Parade During NAIDOC Week Sunday 2nd to Sunday 9th July 2023.

GRANTS AWAITING OUTCOME

GRANTS UNDER CONSIDERATION

(over 3 yrs – Yr 1 is \$300k / Yr 2 is \$300k and Yr 3 is \$320k) to deliver actions or recommendations that are shovel ready programs and form part of Councils Reef Guardians action plan at time of application. This aligns with Councils Reef Guardian Action plan to upgrade and repair councils' drinking water treatment plant and water systems

including replace the non-functioning SCADA system. The repairs, upgrades and replacement of equipment will reduce the land-based run-of contaminated water to the reef from the damaged water infrastructure, incorrect dosage of chemicals, seepage and leaching from joints/shoulders.

Get Ready Queensland Disaster Resilience - \$8,720

The program provides funding to support local governments to deliver activities that increase understanding of disaster preparedness and improve disaster resilience in their communities.

Indigenous Knowledge Centre Establishment and Refurbishment Grant 2022-2023
 Grant funding between \$10,000 and \$60,000 is available to assist Indigenous Councils to establish a new Indigenous Knowledge Centre, refurbish or relocate an existing Indigenous Knowledge Centre. IKC Establishment and Refurbishment funding can be used for interior furnishings and non-fixed items such as: Hard and soft furnishings, equipment, signage and air-conditioning.

FORECAST OPPORTUNITIES

- Transport and Main Roads Track to Treaty program \$500,000.00
 Mobility Strategy to design, plan and implement a transport system for Yarrabah including micro mobility and light public transport.
- Growing our Regions Program \$300 million Round 1 will open for expressions of interest on 5 July 2023, with \$300 million available to support capital works projects for community and economic infrastructure across regional and rural areas. This funding fits in with Councils proposed Balamba development which is community focused infrastructure.
- Gather and Grow for a home gardening pilot study Grant funding In conjunction with QLD Government Health and Wellbeing program. The project will provide up to 20 families/homes receiving a minimum of 1 gardening pod to grow fruit and/or vegetables (details may vary on the needs of the families that participate).

The Grants' Team are continuing to research and build a comprehensive current list/status of all projects, grants applied, forecast opportunities, and grant briefs, in collaboration with each YASC Department.

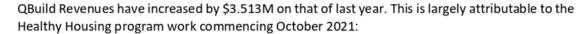
Council's Operating result is a loss of \$4.766M to the end of May 2023, which is under budget by \$280K.

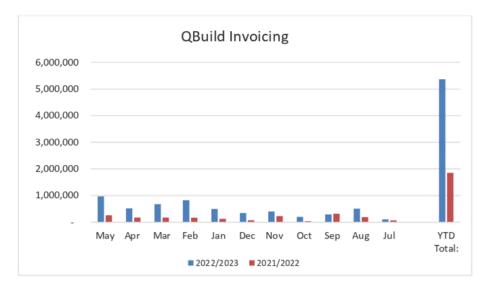
Recurrent income is \$765K over budget.

Recurrent expenditure is \$485K under budget. Employee costs continually to track relatively on budget, materials and services costs exceeded budget by 397K whilst finance costs are below budget due to the provision for doubtful debts calculation that is not done until the end of the financial year.

Depreciation was over budget by \$435K as a result of a large revaluation of asset values at end of financial year 2021-22.

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QBuild R&M's YTD profit is \$2k. Last month's YTD loss was \$ 108K. This is the third month of continued monthly profitability indicating corrective actions taken are working. However, Council still needs to maintain a heavy focus on this Directorate as profit margins are not where they should be.

Actions taken or to be taken:

- 1. Pricing by Building Services has now been reallocated to three Works Dept resources instead of through one only. This is to increase both the speed and accuracy of the process.
- Director Building Services has identified 3 R&M staff who are being actively encouraged to
 either set up their own contractor business or get employment with existing contractors
 currently working in community. The current status of this action can be covered by the
 Director Building Services.

Of the \$5.011M owing to Council, only \$1.627M is estimated as collectable with \$3.384 million included in our provision for doubtful debts. A full recalculation of doubtful debts provision will be completed at end of the financial year.

Over the past 12 months, the rental arrears to Council for social housing has increased by 22% from \$2,156,415 to \$2,628,023. A review of debtors has highlighted the following:

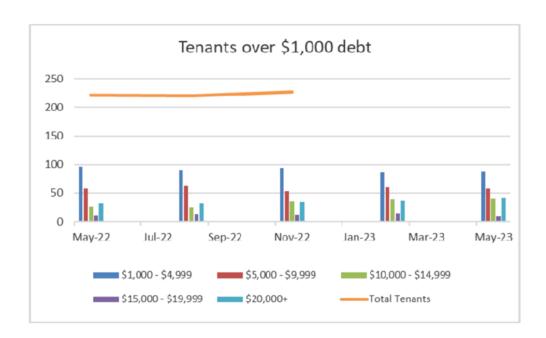
61% of current tenants are in arrears and 87 total tenants owe over \$1,000 which is 1 more tenant than the previous quarter. May's housing debt increased by \$63,458 on that of the previous month.

The 41 debtors owing over \$20k increased by \$18K on that of last month from \$1.268M to \$1.286M.

For the month of May 2023, 130 discussions have been conducted with tenants who are in arears and 71 Form 11 breach notices issued. 241 form 11 Breach notices have been issued year to date.

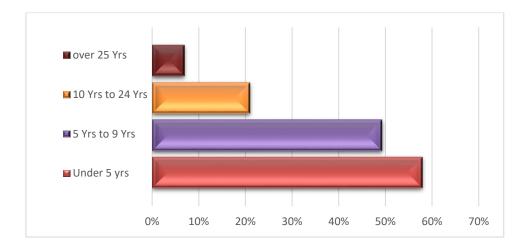




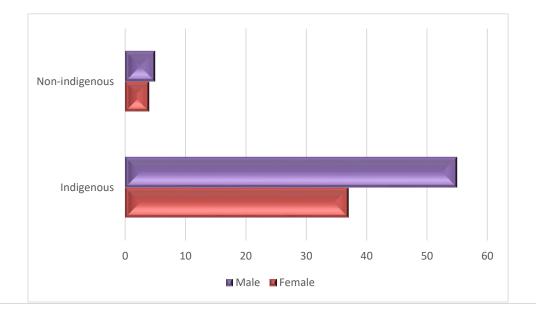
Staffing By Areas

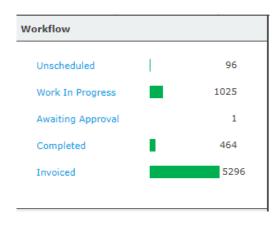

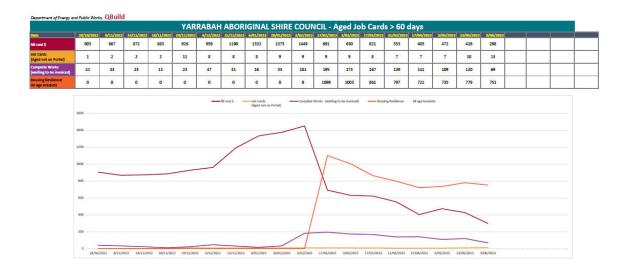

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To provide Council with information to enable the awarding of a tender for the Balamba Masterplan.

BACKGROUND

Council has taken the proactive decision to allocate the Forward Remote Capital Program funding, usually reserved for housing delivery, to the Staged Development of Balamba. The Master Plan is the first step towards delivering serviced land including earthworks, road works and trunk infrastructure (sewer, water and stormwater) for future housing stages.

Providing sufficient housing for residents is a Council priority. Council also wants the housing to meet the needs and expectations of residents including being easy to maintain and designed for the tropical climate of Yarrabah.

Housing is the most pressing need in community, having fundamental effects on all other areas of community life and individual health and wellbeing and long term, intergenerational impacts.

This project is genuine community development.

At the February Ordinary Meeting Council resolved to (resolution 07:23/02/2023):

- 1. Stop work on the Djenghi subdivision Stages 6A & B and 7A & B as the geotechnical constraints of the hillslope development make the development a poor investment at this time.
- 2. Request a variation to the existing Funding Agreement for the Forward Remote Capital Program (6.520M) to commit this funding to:
 - a. \$500,000 to Master Plan the Staged Development of Balamba and \$120,000 to Master Plan Ambrym Street;
 - Undertake the construction of serviced lots including earthworks, road works and trunk infrastructure (sewer, water and stormwater) to service establish developable lots for future housing stages;
- Prepare a submission to the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy for how the notional \$5 Million funding will be allocated for residential lot development and trunk infrastructure to achieve social housing outcomes;
- 4. Call for tenders for a Master Plan for the Balamba subdivision; and
- 5. Call for tenders for a Master Plan for the Ambrym Street redevelopment.

The tender panel was appointed by the CEO and was chaired by Terry Farrelly, Director Community Services and the panel members were Michael Geoghegan, Works & Infrastructure – Project Manager and Gerhard Visser, Program Manager, Town & Environmental Planning at DSDATSIP.

The evaluation criteria required tenderers to have both strong First Nations experience and a strong Cairns based Consultants so that there is a strong local presence, during design and implementation of the Master Plan. Tenderers were also required to address criteria including:

- Demonstrated experience in design and delivery of critical community infrastructure and housing with First Nations communities.
- Lessons learned from similar projects.
- Experience in co-design designing solutions, where community members are included as collaborators in the design process, and ideally the co-design process is indigenous led.
- Exceptional value for money. As the tender included the price of the contract (\$480,000)
 the value for money is demonstrated in the services provided rather than simply a low
 price.

The evaluation panel shortlisted (alphabetical order):

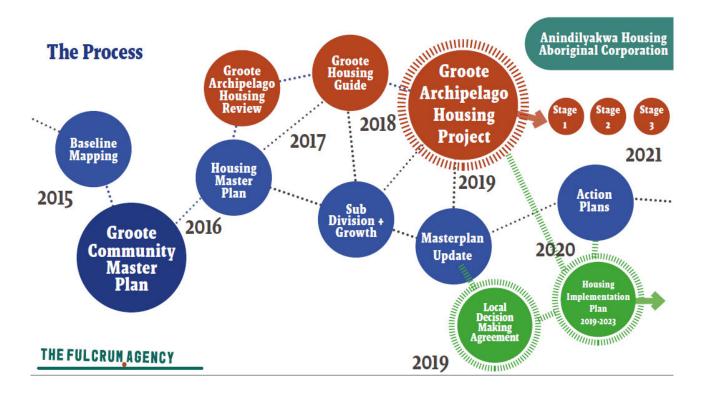

The final selection was between AECOM and CA Architects and the scoring for each firm was close. CA Architects with the Fulcrum Agency have been selected as the preferred tenderer. The final decision reflects the experience of:

• The Fulcrum Agency in developing housing on Groote Eylandt in response to the lack of housing and the lack of housing that was culturally inappropriate, easy and affordable to maintain and climate appropriate (see attached). Between 2015 and 2021, the Groote Eylandt project progressed from masterplan to implementation and included a housing design guide, subdivision and infrastructure plan, local decision making and a post-development evaluation.



• **CA Architects:** with recent completed projects including Cooktown's Reconciliation Rocks and Waalmbal Birri Heritage & Culture Centre which includes commemorative sculptures, informal amphitheatre and a new building for the Cooktown Re-enactment Committee and museum, sensitively placed into its surroundings.

CA Architects and The Fulcrum Agency have corroboratively worked with the Eastern Kuku Yalanjiwarra to co-design their new community and tourism hub and CA Architects also work with the Alngith people and Napranum community to develop new housing typologies for Napranum.

The experience of AECOM, POD and Gudju Gudju is also acknowledged:

- AECOM has undertaken master planning on behalf of DSDATSIP following Communities across
 Cape York, however the implementation of the master plans is not as strong as the work of
 the Fulcrum Agency.
- Gudju Gudju Fourmile is an elder and ceremonial leader of the Gimuy Walubara Yidinji people. His parents grew up in Yarrabah and his mother's family is Gunggandji and Kuku Yalanji. Gudju Gudju's knowledge of, and connections in, Yarrabah are extensive and he has worked in many roles that blend design and engagement, landscape and housing. Gudju Gudju works closely with Jenny Lynch, an ecologist and advocate. Together they created Abriculture, a land management, engagement and landscape design consulting practice.
- People Oriented Design (POD): Gudju Gudju, Jenny Lynch and Shaneen Fantin of POD have been working together since 2011 and have successfully undertaken the design and engagement of a number of projects including the Synapse Community Living Initiative in Manunda Cairns, and the Yidinji Memorial Places at Wrights Creek and Stoney Creek (in documentation).

The recommendation of CA Architects reflects the strength of the successful delivery of not just the Groote Eylandt masterplan, but the implementation of the subdivision including infrastructure, culturally appropriate and climate responsive housing and a process of local decision making. Together this project team has an unrivalled track record in working with Aboriginal communities in the consultation, codesign and delivery of master planned community housing.

Council will note that CA Architects and Blaklash are currently undertaking the Foreshore Project and CA Architects are recommended to be awarded the Ambrym Street project. The Ambrym Street project was offered through an invitation to tender process, and just one tender submission was received. The opportunity to have a consistent presence by a project team potentially brings a range of benefits including:

- the opportunity to undertake more detailed engagement with community members
- an economy of scale in engagement with Councillors, Council staff and the community
- greater value for money as the project engagement, meetings and design discussions can be undertaken in parallel.

RISK

The risk is if works do not proceed, Council could potentially lose funding for this project and will be unable to deliver the developed land and future housing for the community.

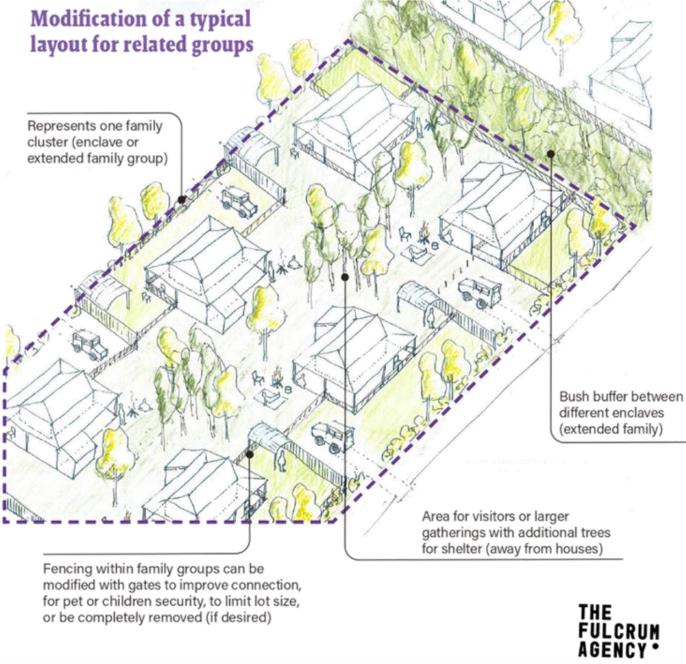




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Settlement Pattern

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To provide Council with information to enable the awarding of a tender for the Ambrym Street Masterplan.

BACKGROUND

Council currently builds 6-10 social houses a year. To build more houses serviced land (water, sewerage, electricity, drainage) is required.

This project provides an opportunity to design Yarrabah's first infill development that responds to local requirements, needs and aspirations of the community.

- The Ambrym Street masterplan will become a resource to assist with obtaining funding.
- The Tender process allows Council to gain a more detailed understanding of the likely costs
 of developing the site including the number of new lots, number of new bedrooms and
 number of new houses.
- Having the masterplan will then allow Council to deliver the development in stages as required.

At the February Ordinary Meeting Council resolved to (resolution 07:23/02/2023):

- Stop work on the Djenghi subdivision Stages 6A & B and 7A & B as the geotechnical constraints of the hillslope development make the development a poor investment at this time.
- 2. Request a variation to the existing Funding Agreement for the Forward Remote Capital Program (6.520M) to commit this funding to:
 - a. \$500,000 to Master Plan the Staged Development of Balamba and \$120,000 to Master Plan Ambrym Street;
 - Undertake the construction of serviced lots including earthworks, road works and trunk infrastructure (sewer, water and stormwater) to service establish developable lots for future housing stages;
- 3. Prepare a submission to the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy for how the notional \$5 Million funding will be allocated for residential lot development and trunk infrastructure to achieve social housing outcomes;
- 4. Call for tenders for a Master Plan for the Balamba subdivision; and
- 5. Call for tenders for a Master Plan for the Ambrym Street redevelopment.

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ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

The Invitation to Tender was sent to three consultants in accordance with Council's purchasing policy. The purchasing policy allows for invitation to tender when the tender value is less than \$199,999. This tender has a fixed price of between \$120,000 to \$150,000 exclusive of GST.

The Invitation to Tender process requires Council to give the invitation to at least three people or entities which Council considers can meet its requirements at competitive prices. In this instance, Council has had previous experience with the three invited consultants:

- 1. POD who are currently preparing designs for 6 social houses,
- 2. CA Architects who are preparing the Foreshore MasterPlan and
- 3. Reel Planning who prepared the Yarrabah MasterPlan for DSDSATSIP.

Tender Opening Date: Monday 6 March 2023 Tender Closing Date: Monday 16 April 2023.

One response was received from CA Architects in partnership with the Fulcrum Agency.

The Invitation to Tender Process confirms that Council considers CA Architects meet its requirements at competitive prices. In this instance the tender process also provided a fixed price range, which the CA Architects response complies with.

In light of the above, and as there was only one submission, a formal tender panel was not convened. However this report provides a brief assessment against the evaluation criteria.

BACKGROUND

Each year in accordance with the *Holidays Act 1983* local governments are invited to request special holidays to be observed during the following year for districts in their area.

A local council requested special holiday is a public holiday only if it is in respect of an agricultural, horticultural or industrial show. Under federal industrial relations legislation, on a public holiday employees are, without loss of ordinary pay, entitled to be absent from work or refuse to work in reasonable circumstances. Employees who work on a public holiday are entitled to penalty rates in accordance with their award or agreement.
