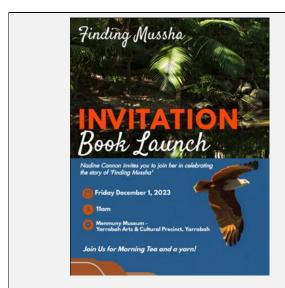

# **GRANTS SUBMITTED DURING PERIOD**

• **Federal Governments Reef Guardian Council Funding** - **\$510,000** Yarrabah Sewage Treatment Plant Upgrade – De-sludge and installation of new electrical switchboards.

# **GRANTS APPROVED DURING PERIOD**

- Regions Program Round 1 Successful expression of interest. Council has been invited to submit an application for the next stage.
  - o \$4,462,320 Balamba Social Infrastructure & Ambrym St capital works
  - \$15,000,000 Regional Transaction Centre –New store, and commercial/office tenancy space
  - \$3,850,000 Deadly Short Stay Cabins - Deadly Short Stay Cabins are 10 purpose-built accommodations.

# **GRANTS AWAITING OUTCOME**

- Federal Governments Reef Guardian Council Funding \$920,000 over 3 years
  - Yarrabah Sewage Treatment Plant Upgrade Surface Aerators to improve the quality of the final effluent prior to discharge to the local creek by installing a surface aeration system.
  - Fuel Tank Upgrades Remove and replace existing underground fuel tanks and replace with above ground tanks and fuel bowser. Includes removing the old fuel tank near the supermarket. –
- Queensland Art BIA Strategic Development Project Fund \$50,000 \$10,000 for the website update/shopping cart and \$40,000 for upcoming exhibition at the Cairns Courthouse which is called 'Charcoal.

These have been approved however, any announcements have been embargoed.

• **Regional Connectivity Program - \$ 670,476** NBN as lead applicant. Fixed Wireless internet for Yarrabah.

Council's Operating result is a loss of \$3.152M as at 31 December is better than budget by \$591.

Recurrent income is over budget by 306K. Whilst sales from QBuild Planned Maintenance works continues to exceed budget, budgeted FAGS 23-24 funding was prepaid in June 23 resulting in the budget shortfall for Grants & Subsidies.

Recurrent expenditure is \$285K under budget. Staff costs remain under budget by \$405K as the state wage case has not been finalised to date. Materials and services costs are over budget by \$116 (as compared to K529K in November), thus in line with increased turnover from QBuild Planned Maintenance.

Planned maintenance YTD profit is \$192k. Whilst a positive result, Council needs to be aware that the net profit ratio is still below the budgeted ratio, showing more corrective action still needs to be taken.

# Snapshot: SOCIAL HOUSING DEBT LEVEL (CURRENT)

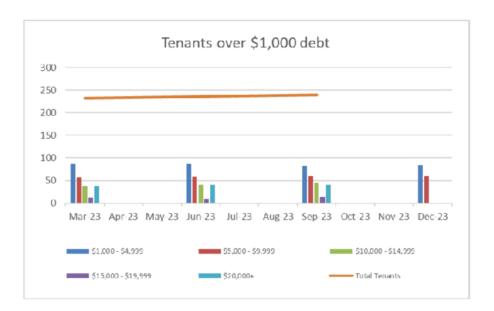
Over the past 12 months, the rental arrears to Council for social housing has increased by 19% from \$2,409,011 to \$2,859,255. A review of debtors has highlighted the following:

63% of current tenants are in arrears and 243 total tenants owe over \$1,000 which has increased by 3 on that of the previous quarter. December's housing debt increased by \$34,112 compared to the previous month.

The 43 debtors owing over \$20k increased by \$15K on that of last month from \$1.406M to \$1.421M.

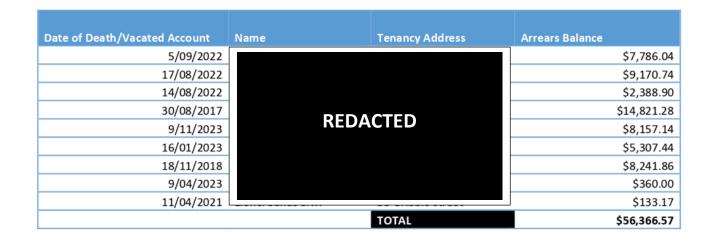

So far, we have dealt with two parents' complaints, which have now been addressed. Suggestions for improvement will be discussed as part of our goals and measures in the New Year so that they are directly linked to our Service Philosophy vision.

Over the past month we have had multiple rooms booked in with different organisations and stakeholders, where staff made sure rooms were prepared and clean before every use and locked up when they were finished.

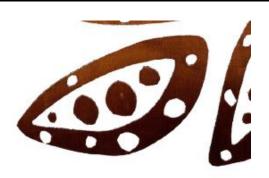

- Arup officially opened their new office at the Cairns Corporate Tower. Aunty June Noble and Aunty Carol Warta artwork were printed on material and used on the furniture in their new building. Aunty June and Aunty Carol were paid \$2000 each last year for this project and were unable to attend due to Sorry Business but are invited anytime to view. # About the art

'Seeds' created in 2021, represents how our Country has sustained us for over 65,000 years, our circle of life. Our culture has a strong connection with Country, we understand this of our great teacher. We listen to the messages that whisper through every plant, animal and tree. Our culture has held strong since time immemorial by listening to these whispers.

# About the artist

Philomena Yeatman is a Gunggandji woman, born in Cairns in 1960 and raised at Yarrabah Community near Cairns in northern Queensland. Philomena's mother's side is Gunggandji and her father's side is Kuku Yalanji. She began her career in the arts in 1991. At first, she experimented with print and jewellery making and shortly after embraced weaving, ceramics and painting. Philomena is a renowned weaver, Learning traditional practices from her grandmother who taught her how to make baskets and mats using pandanus, cabbage palm and natural dyes found in Country, she is passionate about maintaining traditional knowledge. Her vibrant weaving is inspired by traditional forms that were used to carry food collected from the sea and rainforests.

O Art Qld have advised the YACP application to the Backing Indigenous Arts – Art Centre Strategic Development Project Fund was successful. Simone Arnol applied for a total of \$50,000 which included costs to finalise the YACP website to make online sales. Also, funding will go towards upcoming exhibitions 'Charcoal' at the Cairns Courthouse Gallery and workshops. The funding objective was based on the increased capacity of artists and organisations to meet cultural obligations and market demand.

- We are still waiting to hear back from Art Qld for the outcome of the IRADF application submitted in October. Simone Arnol submitted an IRADF application for funding of \$50,000 to action the Menmuny Museum Significance Assessment report which was conducted by Dr Joanna Wills, Senior Museum Development Officer FNQ Cultures and Histories from Qld Museum ton 24 January 2013. The application submitted also included training on museum collections and casual employment.
- We are in weeks 19 of the Certificate III in Visual Arts which commenced on 31 July. The course is delivered by TAFE Qld at the YACP and will run 3 days a week for 20 weeks. This month the students continued theory and have been utilising the Council Training Room. At the start 15 students from the Yarrabah Community were participating and the number has now dropped to 6 students. The students graduate on 13 December and YACP will organise a celebration lunch.
- The students are also interested in staying on as a volunteer artist at YACP and will participate in the 'Charcoal' exhibition scheduled for next year which we just received funding. The funding will provide 10 workshops around drawing with charcoal and etching also 10 workshops working with clay.
- Currently communicating with Daren Miller about the Gurriny SEWB Men's Group to utilise the Yarrabah Arts and Cultural Precinct (YACP) back shed to run activities once a week.
- Simone Arnol is currently with Odette Best, RN PhD Professor Director First Nations Research
  Alliance University of Southern Queensland, to exhibit and curate an **exhibition for Aunty**Murial Stanley to launch in May 2024. We have sourced funding for the exhibition.
- On 30 November, we launched the Gurriny Yealamucka and Yarrabah High School project which worked with the young female students from the high school and their thoughts around blossoming into young women. Those thoughts were turned into pieces of art.
- On 1 December, YACP hosted 2 events: Gunggandji Rangers/Marine Parks meeting (Marine Parks paid to hire the Kiosk area, which is included in our total sales this month), and Nadine Cannon's book launch.

### 5. COMMUNITY EVENTS & PROGRAMS

Remainder of events for 2023 cancelled, due to Sorry Business at this time.

- Bishop Malcolm Park Blessing was a huge success; the YLF and the Church Leaders from St Albans Church, the Malcolm Families and members of the community all participated, the blessing was conducted by the Archdeacon from St Johns Anglican Parish Cairns, followed by a BBQ breakfast, lights refreshments and a cutting of the cake.
- Both the Senior Industry Engagement Manager, and the First Nations Engagement are new team members of Qld Music Festival, and they came out for a visit 21 November, to meet some of our key contacts in community and to learn more about the Yarrabah community; also an overview of the Arts Centre and the YIKC, staff took them around on a successful tour of the community.
- CSO assisting with finalising the delayed Staff Christmas Party coming up and is in the process of planning for the upcoming Survival Day Event January 2024.

• Get Ready kits were prepared and distributed to the community and to residents living out at Back Beach and Wungu.

As of December 15th, all training sessions and room rentals at the RTC building concluded for the year. We have now returned to our regular operational schedule.

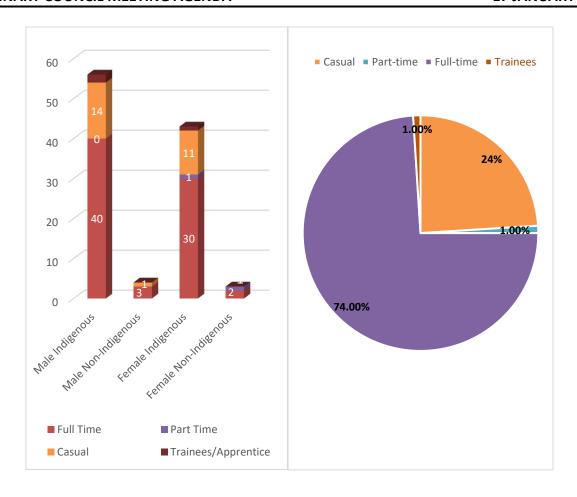

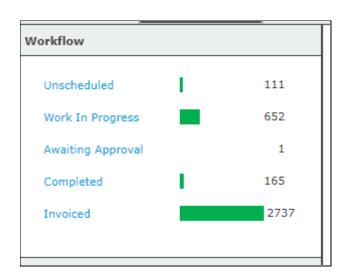

### **BACKGROUND**

The Yarrabah Men's Shed was incorporated in 2017 to provide a safe and secure gathering place for men in the community. Since that time there have been disruptions in its ability to provide this valuable service to community due to financial support and suitable facilities.

### **COMMENT**

- COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS The Men's Shed shall comply with all relevant laws and regulations in the use of the Premises.

I am writing to request your support for funding to assist with the formation of the Yarrabah Men's Shed.

Yarrabah is an Indigenous community founded in 1892 and located approximately one hours drive from Cairns. An official population of approx. 2600 is recognised, however data from the local Gurriny Yealamucka Health Service and Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council put the population numbers closer to 4500 - making it the largest Indigenous community in Australia. A significant portion of the population is under 25 years of age.

Yarrabah is not regarded as a 'remote' community, but it does share similarities with many remote communities throughout Australia. A non-existent public transport service, minimal and under-resourced community facilities, poor infrastructure, technology limitations, geographical barriers and a range of social and economic issues with a reliance on welfare are all prominent. There is also a distinct lack of what would be considered 'regular' services to most people, eg retail shopping.

The proposed Yarrabah Men's Shed is a venue that would address some of the challenges that currently exist in Yarrabah. As a safe and secure gathering place for men in the local community, it would provide a place to build and repair equipment, deliver training programs, share knowledge, learn new skills, socialise, practice culture and pass on wisdom across the generations.

The electorate of Mulgrave encompasses the Yarrabah community. In my role as the State Member for Mulgrave, I have had a close connection with residents, local groups, service providers and the Council for many years. I agree that the Yarrabah Men's Shed would bring multiple benefits to this community and strongly support the formation of the Men's Shed, its ongoing operations and applications for funding.

I have no hesitation in supporting the application of the Yarrabah Men's Shed. Should any further information be required, please do not hesitate to contact my office.

During the Gurriny Men's Forum held in 2023, a key agenda item was the formation and delivery of the Yarrabah Men's Shed. I understand that the Yarrabah Men's Shed was incorporated in 2017 but has not been fully operational since.

During the forum, I advised the forum that Wugu Nyambil, through our Capacity Building Fund may be able to access some funds to operationalize the Men's Shed. Since then, I have held a few meetings with Brent Pearson and other Men's Shed committee members to identify some key needs of the Men's Shed so that I could submit a funding application. This has since been completed and submitted.

I can now formally advise you that Wugu Nyambil, in partnership with the Yarrabah Men's Shed that this submission was made successful recently and Wugu Nyambil (on behalf of the Yarrabah Men's Shed) now have access to approx. \$190,000 in funding to operationalize the Men's Shed.

A key item that I require before any of the funding will be released to Wugu Nyambil is to confirm the arrangement of the Men's Shed facility at Balamba between the Council and Yarrabah Men's Shed.

If you can confirm in writing that there is an agreement in place with the Yarrabah Men's Shed that they have access to the proposed YASC building/shed for the use of Men's Shed activities. Once confirmed, our funding body will release the funding and I can start purchasing materials, equipment, insurances and also employ a Men's Shed Coordinator for the next 12 months. Please note that this funding will also include improvements to the building including security, internet capability, paving, BBQ area, pergola, maintenance etc so there is ongoing value to Council through asset improvements.

### **PURPOSE OF THE REPORT**

### Report prepared by Nikki Huddy, Director of Planz Town Planning.

To seek Council resolution in relation to a Development Application for a Reconfiguration of a Lot (Boundary Realignment) and Material Change of Use for Short Stay Accommodation (10 Cabins in stages) for the purposes of transitional housing over land at Swamp Road, Yarrabah described as Lot 156 SP284220 and Lot 909 SP284220.

### **APPLICANT**

CA Architects on behalf of Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council as Trustee for the DOGIT.

### **NATURE OF THE USE**

- 1. The application is for 10 Cabins for transitional housing, which is defined as *short stay accommodation* in the Planning Scheme. Full plan attached.
- Council has funding for 5 Cabins and is applying for funding for 5 more Cabins. As the Cabins are subject to funding, the application nominates the development may occur in stages. This report includes a recommendation to go to tender for the construction of up to 10 Cabins.
- 3. The site is on 2 lots outlined in red on the adjoining air photo. The application also includes a boundary realignment (Reconfiguration of a Lot) so that the accommodation use is on its own lot, and the balance area including the cricket pitch is on its own lot. The proposed new lot for the cabins is attached. With the balance area forming the second new lot.

Creating 2 new lots to reflect the uses, is good planning practice and likely to make new development on either lot, easier in the future.





### **BACKGROUND**

The Cabins are Council's first transition housing and the design has focused on delivering a high standard of amenity, similar to accommodation found at Mapoon and Horn Island. The project will deliver short term accommodation to a Holiday Park standard including:

- 10 cabins with kitchen, bathroom, laundry, air-conditioning and storage
- Some cabins will be suitable for people with disabilities
- Sealed access (600m x 3.5m approx.)
- Sealed car/boat parking spaces and 1 shipping container space per cabin
- Outdoor communal areas including shelters, tables, seating, bbqs and sinks
- Landscaping including shade trees and privacy planting between cabins
- Externa lighting for each cabin
- Bin storage
- Security cameras
- Privacy fencing between the existing houses and the cabin accommodation
- Perimeter fencing to the cabin accommodation
- Solar panels for each cabin
- Signage.

The project also includes site grading and levelling, drainage, connection to water and sewerage.

When not used as transitional housing, the cabins have the potential to be rented out for short term stays, for example:

- to family and friends visiting Yarrabah
- Health professionals
- Emergency service personnel for disaster training and post disaster recovery
- Visiting netball and football teams
- Celebrity visitors e.g. Cowboys Rugby League team; Artists performing at the Yarrabah Band Festival. Additional Considerations

### **ASSESSMENT**

In accordance with section 45 (5) of the Planning Act 2016, Impact Assessment is an assessment that;

- (a) must be carried out -
  - (i) Against the assessment benchmarks in a categorising instrument for the development; and
  - (ii) Having regard to any matters prescribed by regulation for this subparagraph; and
- (b) may be carried out against, or having regard to, any other relevant matter, other than a person's personal circumstances, financial or otherwise.

Pursuant to section 45 (5) of the Act, the categorising instrument for the development is the Yarrabah Planning Scheme 2019 v1.1. Sections 29 and 30 of the Planning Regulation 2017, prescribe additional assessment benchmarks and matters that must be considered in deciding an Impact Assessable development application.

### **CONSULTATION**

The use is Impact Assessable and public notification was undertaken from 7 November 2023 to 27 November 2023. No submissions were received.

The public notification included:

- a. placing public notification signs on the property frontages to Swamp Rd (near the helicopter landing area), Workshop Rd (on the laneway) and Sawmill Rd (near the playground). The signs on Sawmill Rd and Workshop Rd were destroyed before the public notice period ended. The Swamp Rd sign remained on the site for the full notification period;
- b. giving written notice to the adjoining owners: this included Council and the one leaseholder;
- c. publishing a notice on Council's website;
- d. publishing a notice on Council's Facebook page.

The destruction of 2 public notification signs, before the public notification period ended, is a minor noncompliance with the statutory public notification requirements, and Council is requested to exercise its discretion under section 53(3) of the Planning Act 2016 to resolve that the public

notification requirements have been satisfied, and in particular the minor noncompliance to public notification:

- 1. has not adversely affected the public's awareness of the existence and nature of the application; and
- 2. has not restricted the public's opportunity to make properly made submissions about the application.

# LOCATION



# BACKGROUND

Yarrabah Shire is home to Queensland's largest Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community (ABS 2020). The beachside community is home to a population of 5000 people, located an hour east of Cairns. Yarrabah is the traditional home of the Gunggandji Peoples at Mission Bay near the main Yarrabah township, and the Mandingalbay Yidinji Peoples to the south. In more recent history, a mission established at Cape Grafton brought in children from camps along the Cairns inlet, including Wanjuru, Madjanydji and Tjapukai people. The diversity of residents and ancestors makes Yarrabah a place of rich cultural and ecological significance.

# THE COASTLINE

The coastline of the Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council area extends approximately 60 km from False Cape to approximately 6 km north of the Russel River mouth.

Yarrabah Beach is bordered by False Cape and Cape Grafton and is 3.3 km long. This beach is a narrow, low-energy high tide strip of sand, fronted by tidal flats. Along the exposed, eastern coastline, there are a number of sandy beaches bound by rocky headlands, including King Beach, Oombunghi Beach, Wungu, Jilgi, and Buddabadoo, as well as Ganyjira with Ganyjira Island adjacent.

The coastal landscape also has cultural, social and economic significance for the local community, who value the protection and sustainability of Land and Sea Country. Important environmental features of the Yarrabah coastline include:

- diverse coastal landscapes including sandy beaches, rocky headlands and offshore reefs
- highly ecologically significant freshwater and intertidal wetlands, seagrass and mangrove forests
- endangered or vulnerable wildlife that depend on the ocean and coastal zone for food, breeding and protection
- · river and creek entrances
- healthy coastal dune systems.

Tourism has been recognised as a sector for future growth in Yarrabah Shire, with several parcels of land identified as suitable for tourism development. This includes facilities and entertainment for visiting tourists. The current Yarrabah Master Plan outlines that the region's cultural assets should be the key drivers for tourism, and there is also increasing interest in developing ecotourism opportunities.

The construction of a new jetty (Walba Nguymbi) at Gribble Point near the Yarrabah township is also likely to enhance the accessibility of future tourism ventures. The jetty has been designed for ferry use.

# TRADITIONAL HISTORY

Yarrabah is the traditional country of the Gunggandji and Mandingalbay Yidinji people. These people had traditional beliefs and values different to those we have today. They were guided by Buleru, ancestral spirits who gave us our cultural law, belief system and creation stories and followed a defined social structure and kinship system.

Our people were hunters and gatherers, the surrounding rainforest and beachside traditional lands around Cape Grafton provided food in abundance. Dwellings were made from material found within the environment, the structure dependent on wet season or dry season needs.

# PROJECTED GROWTH & CURRENT COMMERCE/ SKILLS

# CONTEXT

Yarrabah is located just around the bay from Caims which is often referred to as the Gateway to the North for tourism, and all economic commerce. Each year millions of dollars enter the region through tourism, health, and a multitude of sectors and trades.

During 2021-2022, according to the Cairns Regional Council, the regional economy by sector contributes the following:

- Tourism: \$613 million
- . Manufacturing: \$364 million
- Education: \$673 million
- Arts & Culture: \$158 million
- Construction: \$722 million

These industries represent only a portion of the total yearly commerce within the region, whilst still recovering from the impacts of COVID-19, which are growing yearly with projections speaking to a diverse and expanding

Yarrabah, whilst facing challenges associated with tertiary education and diverse up-skilling strategies, is in a prime position to leverage this strong economic growth to support the economic position of its community. Through strategic implementations that bolster local trade, upskilling strategies, and tourism potential, the Yarrabah Foreshore community will define a benchmark in Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander experiences, showcasing Aboriginal excellence and knowledge.

The Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan has been developed with deep consideration of this strong regional economic positioning, forming a framework that supports local and regional opportunities for growth.

# **CURRENT & FUTURE CONCERNS OF YARRABAH & FORESHORE**

# CONTEXT

Yarrabah exists as a unique and culturally rich community of predominantly Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Nestled between mountainous ranges, it is largely isolated from nearby Caims both physically and socio-economically.

Whilst this rich and unique setting gives Yarrabah and its community the space to define its social structures, it also can form unique issues that require locally considered strategies to manage. Some of the current and future concerns of the Yarrabah community echo similar issues facing remote Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander communities across the continent such as:

- Health & Well-being
- Access to education
- · Transportation & local infrastructure
- Waste management
- Reliable electricity supply
- Telecommunication service

However, in addition to these broader challenges, a series of specific and unique concerns face the people of Yarrabah. These have formed as a result of historical systems during the times of the mission, industry and commerce sectors that no longer exist or have greatly reduced in capacity, and the impacts of climate change. Many of these have been identified through a multitude of planning strategies developed by YASC and include but are not limited to:

- · Wild horse population
- Wild dog population
- Flooding and foreshore erosion
- Vandalism
- Housing
- Land Availability

Many initiatives exist within the community to take a community-led approach to managing these challenges, such as the Deadly Walkers group that tackles health & well-being concerns through encouraging an active lifestyle, and First Nations Rangers programs to culturally manage environmental concerns.

Wherever possible, the Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan has implemented spatial approaches to supporting and mitigating some of the many challenges facing the Yarrabah community.

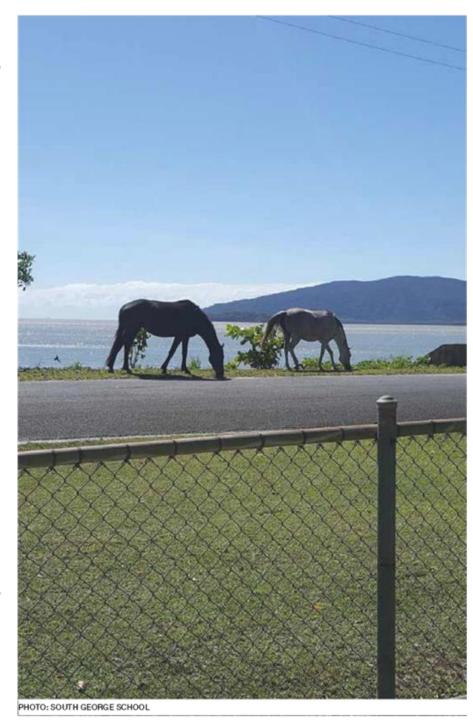

# PROJECTED IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE

# CONTEXT

Yarrabah faces broad and unique challenges as it moves into the future as a growing and rich community. Amongst these, the projected impacts of climate change are expected to pose a considerable threat to not only the health and well-being of the community as a result of rising temperatures, but also to the environmental condition of the Yarrabah Foreshore.

In response to these concerns and the predictions of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), the Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council (YASC) along with five other regional councils formed the River to Reef Climate Resilience Alliance Action Plan. Some of the projected impacts outlined within this include:

- · Significant sea level rise & king tides
- · Less frequent but more intense cyclonic events
- Less frequent but more intense rain fall
- · Increased surface and ocean temperatures

These broad climatic and environmental impacts may have direct significant impacts on the Yarrabah community such as:

- · Heath issues related to increasing temperatures
- Increased local flooding

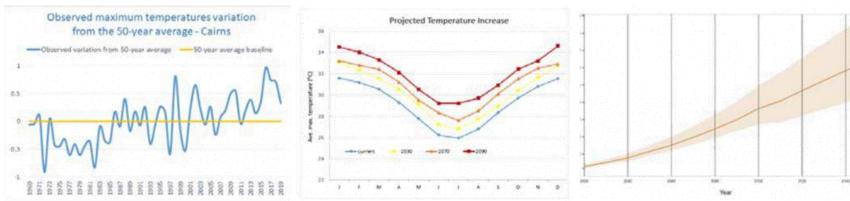

- Limited access to resources and food
- Infrastructure failures and damages
- Increased foreshore erosion
- · Damage or loss of culturally significant locations

Acknowledging this, YASC has formed the Yarrabah Local Disaster Management Plan and the Coastal Hazard Adaptation Strategy (CHAS) to form strategic plans that address the growing concern of climate change.

Whilst accepting its limitations, the Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan has been developed with deep consideration of the existing strategies, such as the CHAS, and projected concerns associated with climatic impacts to further support the resilient future of Yarrabah.

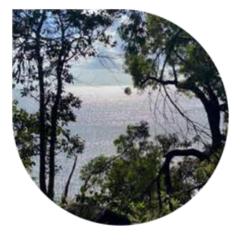

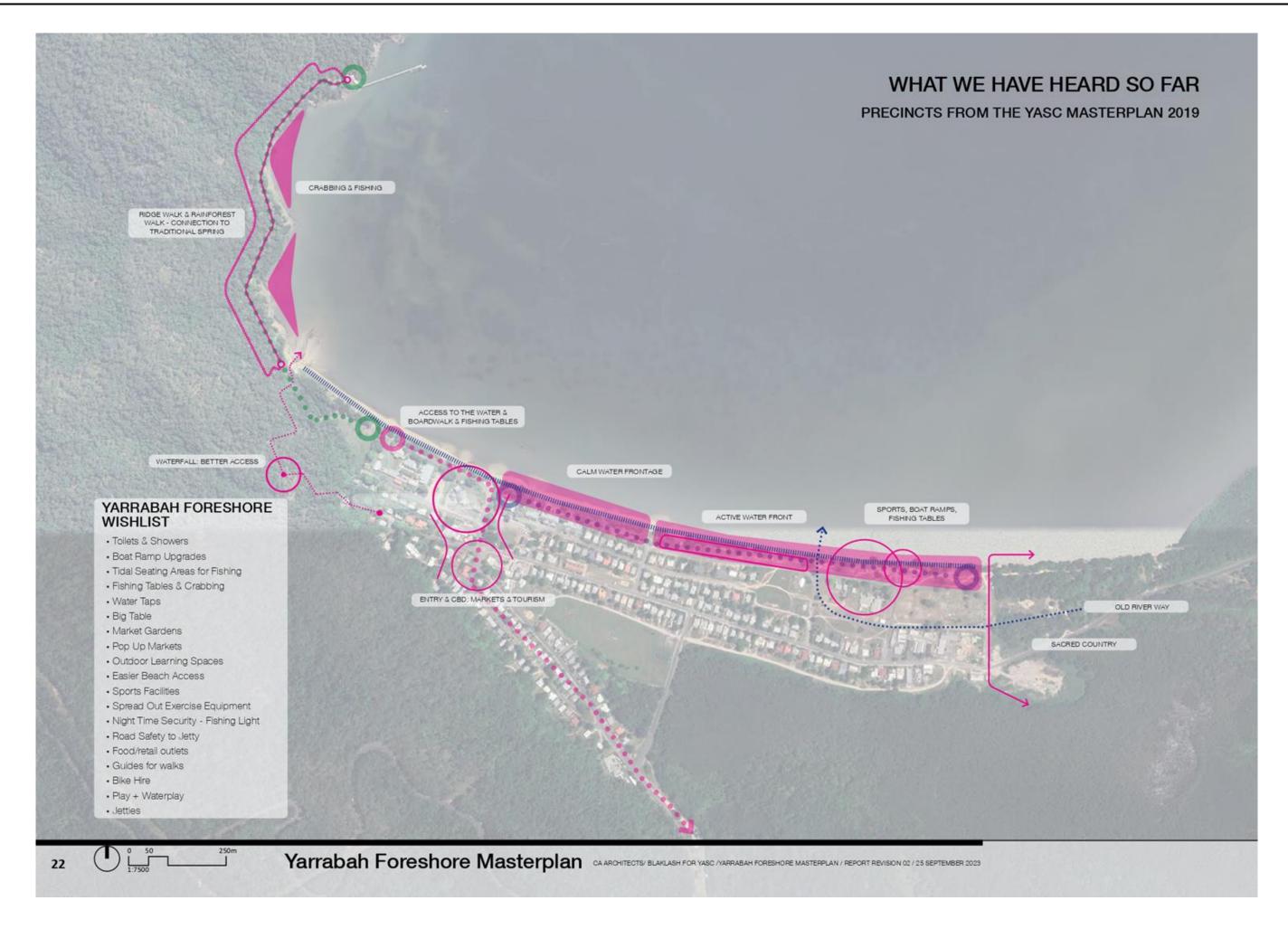

Tropical storms, king tides, and sea level rise are just some of the issues facing the community currently and are likely to worsen in the future.

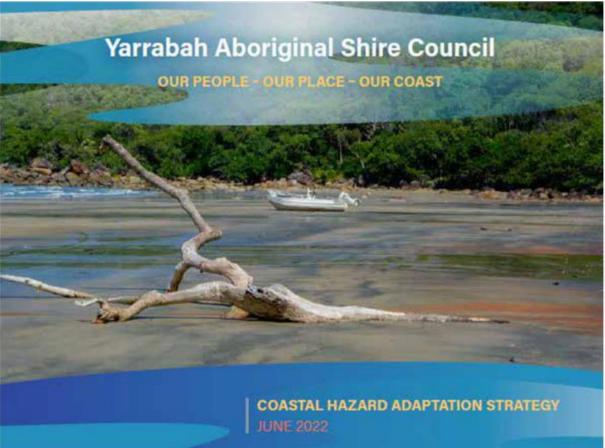
The CHAS document outlines the likelihood of these concerns over the next 100 years and sets out a multitude of potential responses from observation and mitigation, through to adaptation.

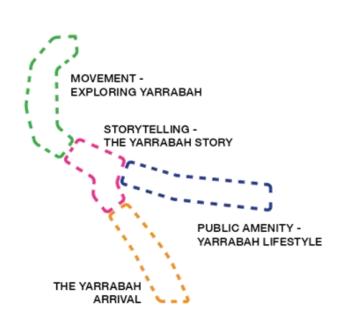

FIGURE 2 -POINTS OF INTEREST



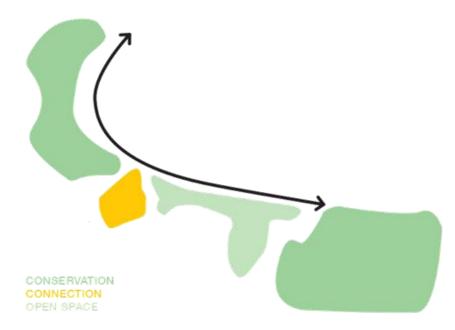
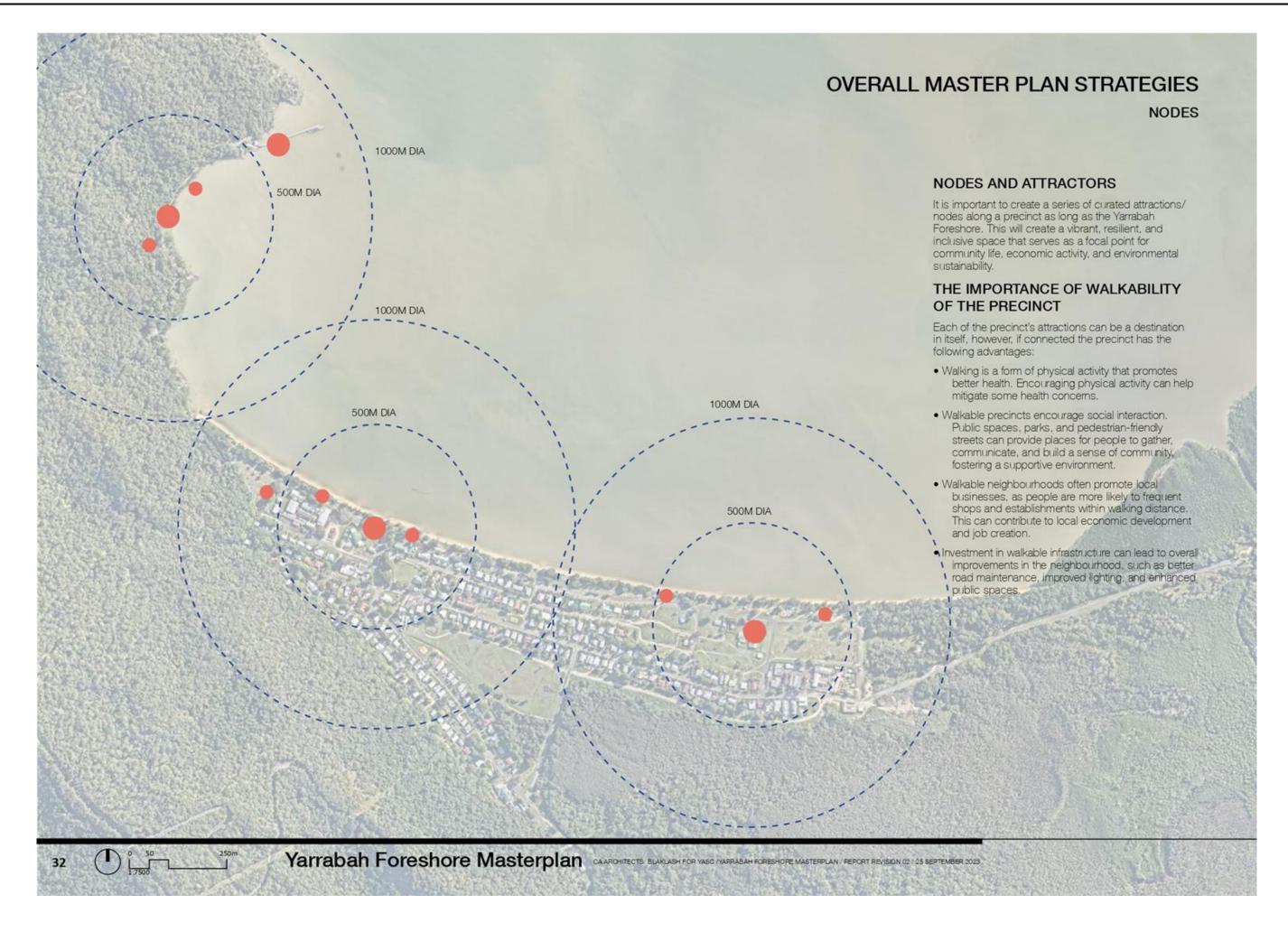


FIGURE 2 - THE FORESHORE PRECINCTS

# WAYFINDING AND SIGNAGE

# A CONNECTED YARRABAH

The Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan proposes a series of holistic spatial outcomes that aim to drive community activation and support connections to the bay. The cornerstones of community lifestyle within the Yarrabah Foreshore area.

To ensure a linked, holistic, and legible connection between each of the precincts as well as offering strong opportunities to share the rich and diverse stories of Yarrabah, a community-wide signage strategy has been developed.

The strategy proposes location and general application of potential signage to support community identity, story-telling, and tourism opportunities. These cover the following signage typologies:

- Wayfinding
- Landmark
- Interpretive Major
- Interpretive Minor







#### WAYFINDING

Wayfinding signage forms the key linkage between spaces and active transport trails. Opportunities exist to enhance understanding of the Rainforest, Foreshore, and History trails as outlined in the master plan. These have been proposed at key junctions, and connected to trail entries.







# INTERPRETIVE MAJOR

Interpretive signage - a major category that proposes prominent and identifiable informative nodes across the community. These become key attractors for visitors to engage with the stories, values, and aspirations of the Yarrabah community.







#### LANDMARK

Landmark signage installations set the identity and instant experience of the Yarrabah Foreshore community. These express large and bespoke, generally artistic, sculptural installations connecting to major entry or focal points within the community.







INTERPRETIVE MINOR

# WAYFINDING AND SIGNAGE

Wayfinding and interpretive signage will play an instrumental role along the new Yarrabah foreshore.

Building upon community skills developed during the jetty project and research into landmarks, stories and knowledge from local elders, the Foreshore project will incorporate these into a series of design elements and interpretive signage.

Landmark signage throughout town and along the foreshore will create a unique and identifying design language for Yarrabah.

# LANDMARK SIGNAGE

Through consultation with the Council during the Yarrabah Masterpan project, a number of important gateways, wayfinding and orientation points have been identified. These include welcome signs, town maps and directional signage to assist visitors travelling to Yarrabah.

When visiting a new place, it is important that people can find their way to their destination easily and without confusion. This is achieved through signage, gateway markers, planting, artworks and to an extent natural features that help orient visitors to the place.

# WELCOME TO TOWN

Yarrabah is fortunate to have a spectacular hillside descent through Pine Creek Yarrabah Road; giving travellers expansive views over the town and the bay, and a sense of arrival and delight.

At the main lookout, it is proposed to replace the existing sign with a welcome sign with a tidy town message and Gunggandji PBC logo. It is likely that TMR approval is needed.

# YARRABAH GATEWAY PARK

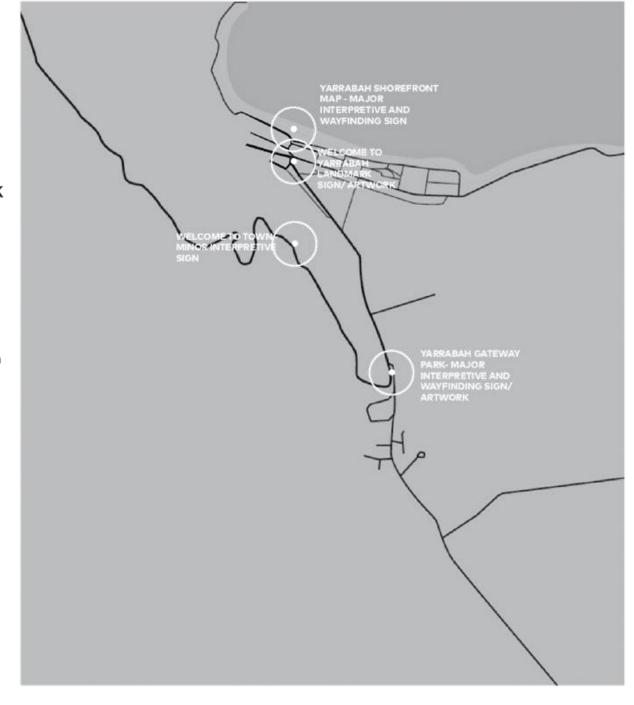

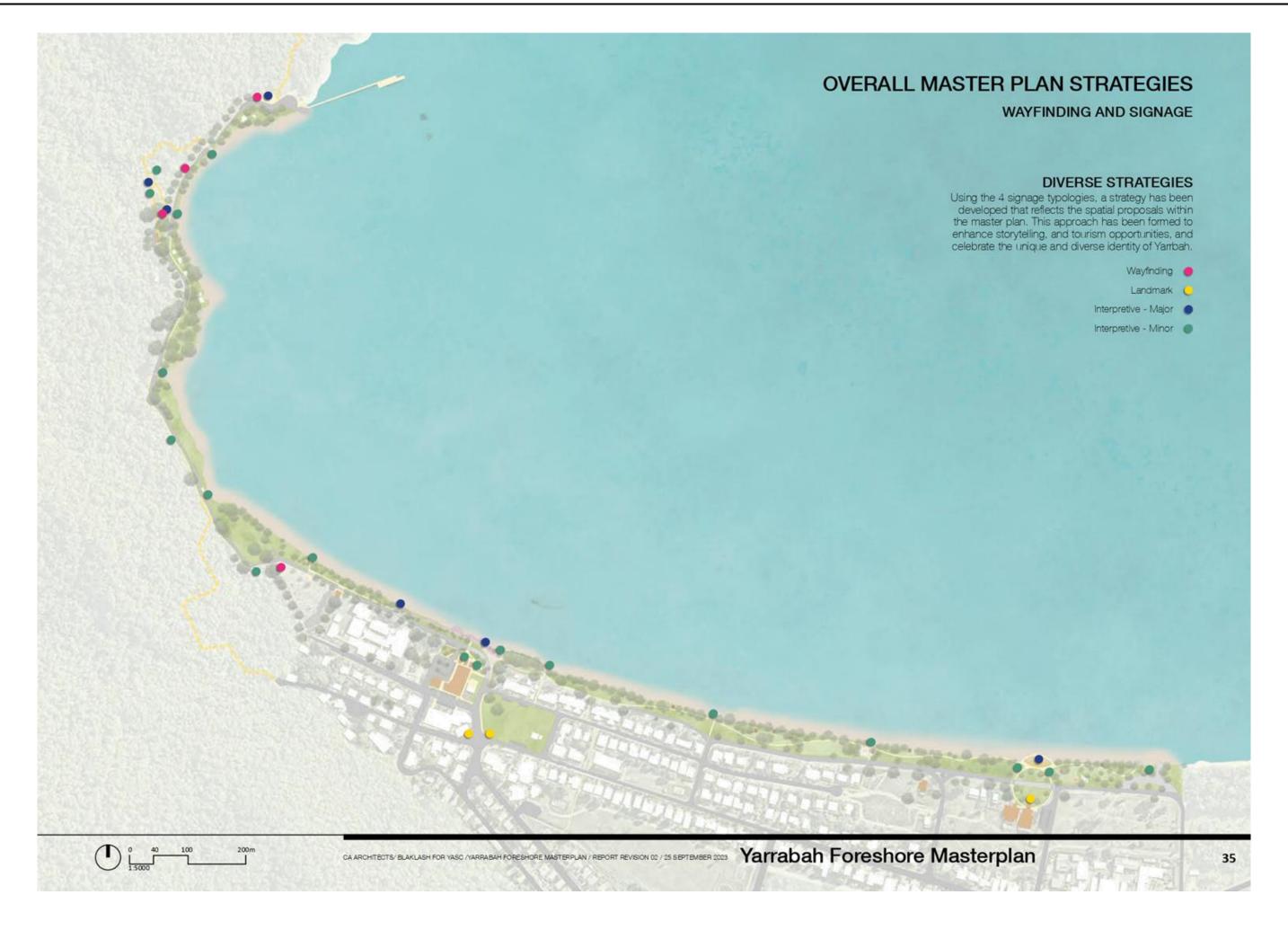

# SUPPORTING YARRABAH LIFESTYLE

Across the Yarrabah Foreshore, a diverse host of furniture styles exists in varied conditions of degradation. Whilst well used, much of the furniture pieces, from concrete picnic tables to remnant jetty structures and burnt-out fire barbecues, no longer support the needs of a growing community.

During the community co-design and collaboration sessions, that have formed the Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan, many community members expressed the need for updated furniture elements along the foreshore to support cultural activation.

Some of the many aspirations identified were in line with enhanced gathering spaces with increased ergonomics, better placement and designed fire cooking areas, boating and fishing amenities, and enhanced access to the beachfront.

In response, furniture strategies developed reflect and support the aspirations of the Yarrabah community now and into the future.

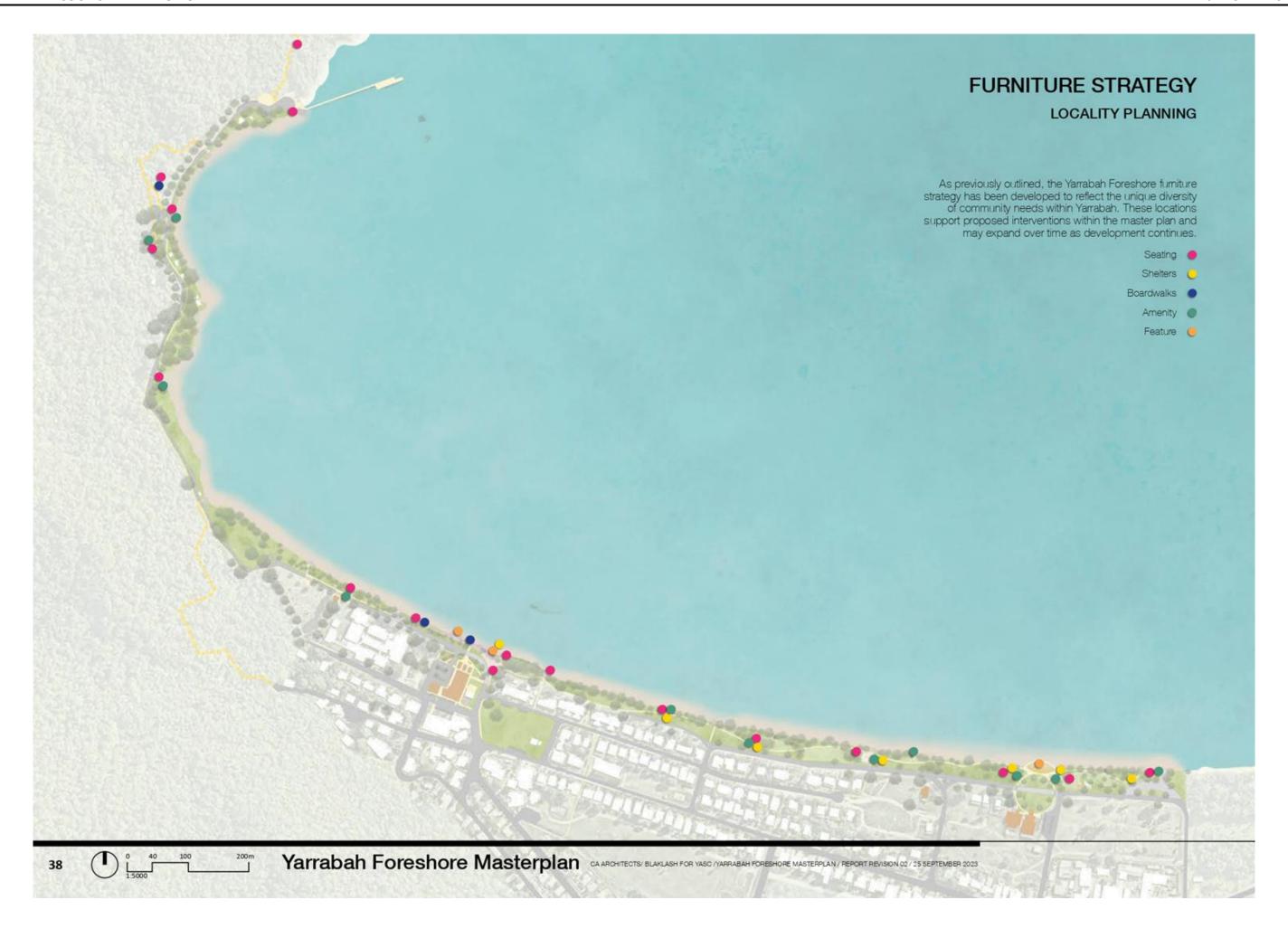

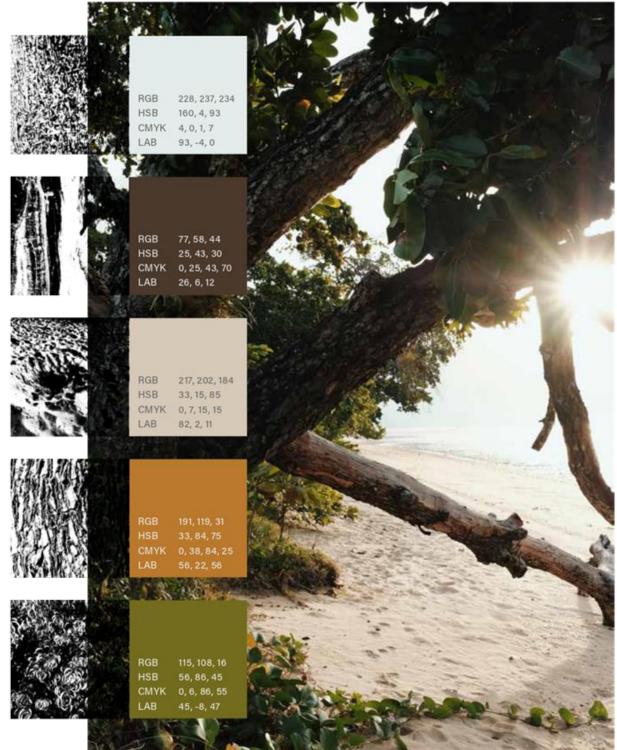

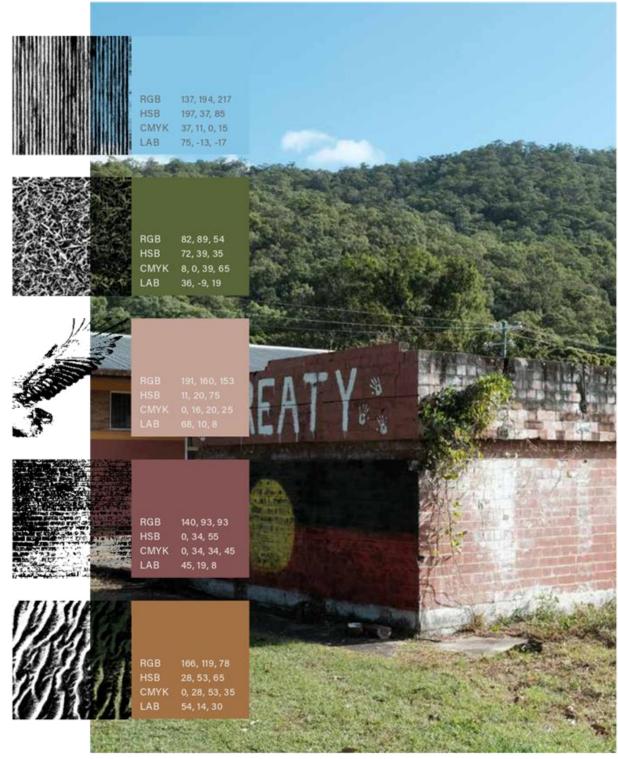

# **PRINCIPLES**

# **UNIQUELY YARRABAH**

Supporting the proposals outlined within the Yarrabah Foreshore Masterplan, the following planting strategy has been developed ensuring the enhancement, support, and celebration of Yarrabah's unique ecologies that shape its identity. The fundamental principles that have shaped the strategic approach have been outlined under the following themes.

### **ECOLOGY**

Driving each decision within the planting strategy is a deep consideration of unique and varied local ecosystems. Species selected and the areas in which they are implemented are to be reflective of context and considerations for ongoing challenges such as climate change and sea level rise. An approach based on Caring for Country.

### CULTURE

Intrinsically connected to local ecosystems and land management, the cultural access and utilization of the planting ecosystems implemented are fundamental to the ongoing support of cultural practice within Yarrabah. The proposed strategy reflects an ongoing dialogue with the community that celebrates the rich cultural connections to Country.

### DESIGN

Supporting local ecosystems and cultural access, the planting strategy will champion modern design techniques that enhance place-based identity, and local amenities such as shade and urban cooling. As projects from the master plan are implemented, a baseline planting schedule will support the Country-centred response to local ecosystems, culture, and identity.

### RESPONDING TO PLACE

### **DIVERSITY & CHARACTER**

With the overarching considerations of Ecology, Culture, and Design embedded in the planting strategy, a place-responsive approach has been developed that reflects the diversity of places to support a cohesive planting strategy. The following locations have been identified as critical to the identity and cultural access of the Yarrabah Foreshore. Each is intrinsically connected as a system within Country, but requires unique considerations and criteria in the application of a Country-centred planting strategy.

### **CULTURAL HUBS**

Forming the primary activation areas that support the local economy, cultural activation, and tourism centres. These locations require feature markers and amenities that identify the significance of the area and support the celebration of Yarrabah.

### **PARKLANDS**

Stretching from the town centre along the foreshore towards the new cemetery, Yarrabah hosts generous parkland areas. Supporting an active and community lifestyle, parklands require strategic approaches that support amenities and activation whilst considering maintenance and durability.

### **RAINFOREST**

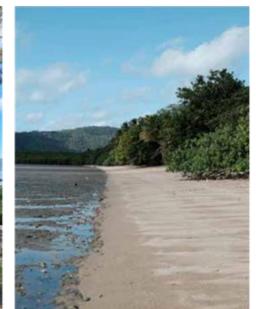

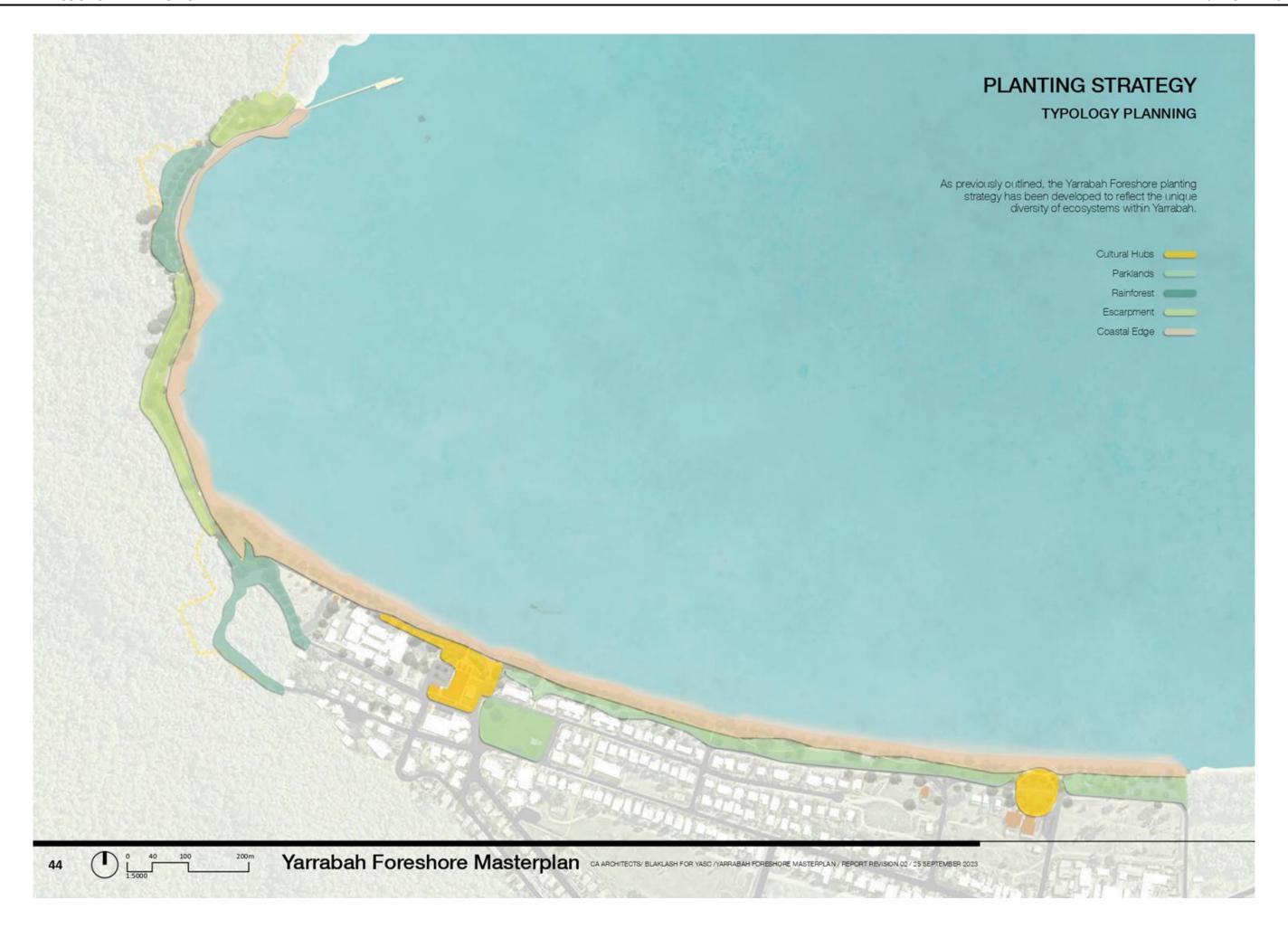

# PLANTING SCHEDULES

Given the diverse and extensive array of local endemic plant species that surround Yarrabah, the following plant schedules have been developed to form a baseline for implementation across the projects outlined within the master plan. These have been assessed based on endemacy, character, and seasonality and then further allocated to the potential precincts.

The species outlined form a baseline for development as projects in the master plan become active. Availability and climatic conditions may vary over time.

The development of a baseline planting schedule also sets the premise for potential economic opportunities within Yarrabah for local nurseries to grow and supply the outlined species ahead of project activation, supporting local commerce.

Additionally, the opportunity to work with the Yarrabah Foreshore community and local Indigenous Ranger Programs to support the implementation and on-ground understanding of how these species support Country.

### **RAINFOREST WALK - OPTIONS DISCUSSION**

Four alternative treatment options were considered for the treatment of the rainforest link. These have been summarised below with a summary discussion of the considered options follows.

# **OPTION 1**

DO NOTHING AND MAINTAIN THE EXISTING ACCESS FOR PEDESTRIANS AND VEHICLES

- · Potential risks of injury or death to pedestrians was deemed too great to provide any treatment;
- The high level of community use and value of the rainforest link ruled out closing the road to either vehicle or pedestrian traffic;
- Do nothing option does not meet Council's requirements, therefore option not considered further.

# **OPTION 2**

UPGRADE THE ROAD TO A FNQROC COMPLYING STANDARD ROAD PROFILE WITH A 2M WIDE PATH ON ONE SIDE.

- · Significant clearing, earthworks, earth retaining structures and infrastructure modifications anticipated;
- · Land resumptions likely required to increase road reserve width for road formation:
- · Will provide a road complying with standard cross-section with full connectivity;
- · Due to geometric constraints will likely require significant local traffic management devices to reduce speeds;
- Meets council requirements so

# **OPTION 3**

INSTALL BOARDWALK ALONG THE COASTAL SIDE

- · Vandalism of timber structures was seen as high risk, coupled with high maintenance costs for coastal boardwalks, the maintenance and repair cost is anticipated to be high;
- · Coastal protection overlays mean boardwalk design and construction would have significant constraints and approvals:
- · Community consultation revealed a desire to retain privacy to existing dwellings along the rainforest link by aligning any pathway on the rainforest side of Point Road.
- Boardwalk option does not meet Council's requirements, so option not considered further.

# **OPTION 4**

REDUCE ROAD WIDTH TO SINGLE LANE PEDESTRIAN FRIENDLY ROAD AND PROVIDE A 2M WIDE FOOTPATH WITHIN EXISTING **FORMATION** 

- · Minor clearing, earthworks and earth retaining structures required. No infrastructure modifications anticipated;
- Minor land resumptions may be required to increase road reserve width for road formation:
- Will provide a road low speed environment road with full pedestrian and vehicle connectivity;
