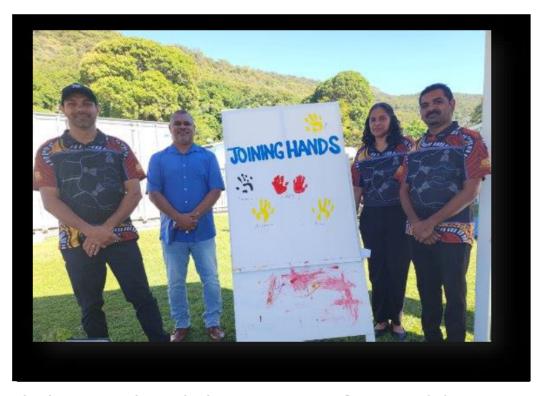

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

Provide council with monthly financial report. This report covers the financial period 31st May 2024.

BACKGROUND

This report is created with the following in mind:

Local Government Regulations, s204 - Financial

- (1) The local government must prepare a financial report.
- (2) The chief executive officer must present the financial report—
 - (a) if the local government meets less frequently than monthly—at each meeting of the local government; or
 - (b) otherwise —at a meeting of the local government once a month.
- (3) The financial report must state the progress that has been made in relation to the local government's budget for the period of the financial year up to a day as near as practicable to the end of the month before the meeting is held.

CEO delegates the reporting responsibility to the Corporate Services Director – Mike Mair.

COMMENT

Council's Operating result is a loss of \$5.541M as at 31 May 2024, better than budget by \$1.319M.

Recurrent income is over budget by 798K. Whilst sales from QBuild Planned Maintenance works continues to exceed budget. Budgeted FAGS 23-24 funding was prepaid in June 23 resulting in the budget shortfall for Grants & Subsidies.

Recurrent expenditure is \$522K under budget. Staff costs remain under budget by \$341K following the state wage case being finalised and effected in April 2024. Materials and services costs are under budget by \$341K (as compared to 522K under budget in April), thus in line with increased turnover from QBuild Planned Maintenance.

Planned maintenance YTD profit is \$312K (as compared to \$193K in March 2024 and \$345K in April).

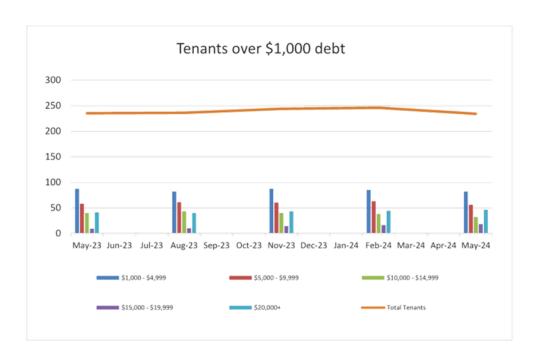
Over the past 12 months, the rental arrears to Council for social housing has increased by 11% from \$2,628,023 to \$2,929,700. A review of debtors has highlighted the following:

60% of current tenants are in arrears and 234 total tenants owe over \$1,000 which has decreased by 9 on that of the previous quarter.

The 46 debtors owing over \$20K increased \$1.538M to \$1.549M.

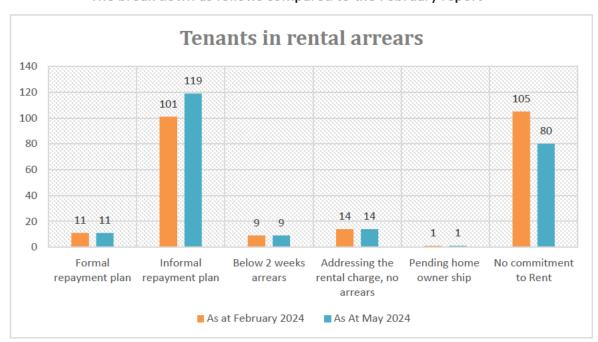
Since the last report in February - YASC Tenancy Team have continued with the approach of conducting house visits for rental arrears.

YASC Tenancy Management team actively monitor rent arrears on a daily basis using the system Chintaro and Centrepay reports that are imported on a daily basis.

Tenancy also keep into consideration the increased sorry business happening within community and support those experiencing hardship due to sorry business.

February 2024 to May 2024

- For the period 15/02/2024- 20/05/2024 we have recovered a total of \$62,900.73 in additional rental arrears repayments as per Chintaro records.
- We have since had 12 more tenants finalize their rental arrears and now currently have rental credit.
- 77 Centrepay forms have been completed by tenants to pay rent/rental arrears.

2. EARLY LEARNING CENTRE (DAYCARE)

The purpose of this report is to give an overview of the Yarrabah Early Learning Centre.

The Center has been working hard to ensure full capacity of children (42) and overdue fees have considerably dropped due to the introduction of payment plans and fortnightly statements.

Health and Wellbeing of Queensland have installed 2 Foodcubes with the children planting seedlings on Elders day the 13th of June. This is quite exciting that the children will participate in growing vegetables and then providing the cook to use them in their daily meals.

Our newly appointed safety representative for the Centre has been checking equipment and reporting identified faults for rectification.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

At the end of month of May we have considerably reduced parent outstanding debt from \$51,064.08 to \$38,916.94. This is a reduction of \$12,147.06 for one month only.

Parents are becoming more vigilant in paying fees and we have been able to assist them with Child Care Subsidy claims and the setting up of fortnightly payments.

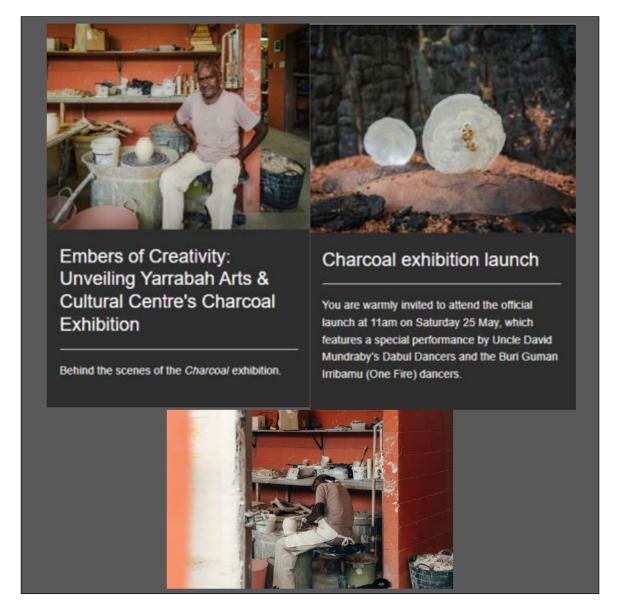

- YACP Manager has submitted a \$60,000 Australian Cultural Diplomacy Grants Program (ACDGP), which supports projects that promote Australia's creative sector and First Nations identity to deepen bilateral partnerships and strengthen reputation as a modern diverse nation internationally, objectives and link below. YACP Manager has contacted JGM Gallery in London who already displays Yarrabah Artist works, a new partnership developed 7 months ago. Jennifer has provided a support letter for this grant, along with YLF. We are still waiting to be advised if successful, if successful the exhibition will be launched in February 2025.
- Old Museum will start first training on 7 May as part of the requirements under the Menmuny Museum Assessment Report 2013. The funding sourced is through the IRADF Funding. This will improve the cultural maintenance, documentation and management of the Menmuny Museum collection. The funding allows YACP to employ a Project Officer which we have advertised and successfully fulfilled this month. The Project Officer will engage with Queensland Museum to deliver training to provide best practice, advice and build community capacity.

- DP&C's & CSO met with Containers for Change representatives in regards to how they can support the community members and increase participation. Yarrabah has the highest rate of Containers for Change within Queensland Indigenous councils/ communities

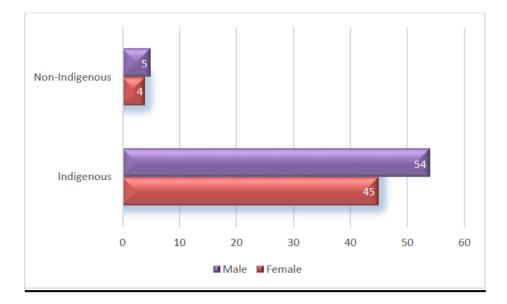








Graph for indigenous / non indigenous employees

7. WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

1. Safety Inductions

Safety Induction was held Thursday 13/06/24 with all the work experience students who are going to work in different work areas of council such as road crew, environmental health and mechanics. Six students attended from Yarrabah High School.

2. LGW Audit

LGW consultant has provided a draft copy of the YASC WHS manual with an updated structure altered to align with the elements of the National Audit Tool to allow for easier audit compliance. WHS Coordinator is in regular contact with the consultant providing feedback and clarification on the document

3. Asbestos Audit

Audit has been progressing slower than expected due to the current workload and prior commitments of council staff tasked with this project.

4. Training

HR Officer has been busy organising training with outside workforce with upcoming training in chainsaw operations which will benefit the Council in a big way in the cyclone season. SES last year would not give any chainsaws to use because no one was ticketed.

Traffic Control practical training will be commencing in the next few weeks so that workers will know how to set signage on the road when working on the roads.

5. Safety Committee

The last Safety Committee was held on the 22/05/24 at the HR Meeting Room.

One of the agenda items discussed was the Incident report form. The current form is outdated and not very user friendly. Committee discussed the issue with LGW Consultant and proposed some changes to make the form easier to use.

Another issue discussed was the SafetyCircle concept. Director People and Communities had a meeting with the SafetyCircle representative to discuss the latest changes and updates of the safety program and how best to implement it across all council departments. A suggestion was raised to contact and perhaps visit the Cairns Regional Council as they have achieved very good results improving their risk and hazard management systems.

6. Incidents

We have had a couple of incidents in the last reporting period. Both were a windscreen damages, to a private and council vehicle, caused by mowing and whipper snipping operations. Further update to the ride on mower injury we have had recently. The Queensland Safety inspector visited council to review the incident, machinery in question and the events leading up to the incident. After reviewing the reports, documentation and discussing the incident with the WHS Coordinator and the Council mechanic, the inspector was satisfied that all necessary measures have been put in place to prevent such an injury happening again. The inspector also reviewed our processes, such as pre-start checks and Safe Work Method Statements, finding them in very good order. The inspector noted that our Council sets the standard and is at the forefront of safety practices among Aboriginal Councils in Queensland.

7. Security

The Security team is reporting a lot of issues with children causing damages to Council properties. Especially targeting Bishop Malcom Park, where they are often gathering, lighting fires and breaking into the toilets to possibly use illegal substances.

2024 Interim report

We present our interim report for Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council for the financial year ending 30 June 2024. This report details the results of our interim work performed to 30 April 2024. Results of our interim audit

In this phase, we assessed the design and implementation of your internal controls relevant to the financial report, and whether they are operating effectively. We assessed the key controls we intend to rely on in auditing your financial statements. Our audit does not assess all controls that management has implemented across the organisation.

Significant deficiencies:

· One unresolved from prior years.

Deficiencies:

- . One raised in the current year relating to formalisation of key components of the IT environment.
- Two unresolved from prior years.

Other matters:

- One raised in the current year relating to resolutions in proximity to caretaker period.
- One unresolved from prior years.

Based on the results of our testing completed to date and the resolution of prior year issues, we have determined your internal control environment does support an audit strategy where we can rely upon your entity's controls.

Deficiencies

24IR-1 - Lack of documentation around IT policies and procedures

Observation

We noted that while an IT policy was adopted during the year, it does not include documented procedures or defined responsibilities with regards to the following key controls:

- User account creation and termination.
- Password requirements and password management.
- · Formal review of user accounts in Windows Active Directory.
- · Third party access management (external users).
- · Database access, backups and maintenance.

Implication

While we acknowledge that Council utilises a qualified external IT service provider, the effect of these findings is that the key elements of a robust IT environment are not clearly documented. Policies are essential for documenting best practice, allowing enforceability and mitigating risks to an acceptable level.

QAO recommendation

We recommend that additional or updated policies are considered with respect to the items mentioned above, including the relevant controls to ensure that Council has enforceable processes in place to appropriately safeguard Council data and resources.

Other matters

24IR-2 - Major policy decisions in close proximity to caretaker period

Observation

We noted that a special meeting was held on 24 January 2024, five days prior to the 2024 caretaker period (29 January 2024). The special meeting included Council resolutions on items that are defined as major policy decisions – namely, entering into contracts over \$200,000 and significant procurement activities (approving preferred supplier arrangements).

We note further that the minutes and agenda of the special meeting were not made publicly available on Council's website, and there does not appear to have been any notice on Council's website that the meeting was taking place.

Implication

The Queensland Government issued a <u>factsheet with guidance</u> around decision making during the caretaker period. The guidance recommends that consideration should be given to whether or not major policy decisions are necessary in the lead up to the caretaker period, as the incoming Councillors are required to implement the major policy decision without having had the opportunity to debate or vote on it.

If these resolutions were made <u>during</u> the caretaker period, they would have been invalid unless Ministerial approval was obtained.

QAO recommendation

We recommend that at the next ordinary Council meeting, the new Council is presented the major policy decisions that were made on 24 January 2024, with an explanation as to why these resolutions were considered at a special meeting rather than being held until an ordinary meeting.

Council should take reasonable steps to ensure that there is adequate public notice of any special meetings in accordance with 254D of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*. Minutes of all Council meetings should also be uploaded to the Council website within ten days of the meeting being held, in accordance with 254F of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*.

Management response

The failure to post the agenda and minutes on Council's website for the Special Meeting conducted on 24 January 2024 was an administrative oversight due to limited resources being utilised in community recovery/coordination efforts related to Cyclone Jasper at that time. This has now been rectified.

To ensure operational efficiencies without prolonged delays in seeking Ministerial approval or awaiting the determination of election results following caretaker period, a special meeting was convened prior to commencement of caretaker period (in accordance with the LG Act and Regulations) for the duly appointed Council of that time to determine the following only:

TENDER REVIEW – YASC TRADES & SERVICES

Due to the workload being experienced by Council Building Services staff and contractors in the delivery of Upgrade, Maintenance and "Healthy Housing" programs, it was identified that there was an urgent operational need to expand Council's preferred suppliers.

Council had given a commitment to Department of Housing and QBuild to address these numbers, particularly with regards to aged jobs by the end of the financial year. To assist, additional suppliers were sought by way of tender.

Delays in approving further suppliers would have impacted on this commitment.

AWARD CONTRACT YASC2023-006 RANGE ROAD/NURSERY ROAD INTERSECTION UPGRADE

Council was successful in obtaining funding for this project with the requirement for completion being for the financial year ending 30 June 2024. The tender for this project opened on 20 December 2023 and closed on 15 January 2024. Due to the extent of work required to complete this project, it was necessary for a resolution by Council.

Any delays in seeking Ministerial approval or waiting for the appointment of the new Council following the quadrennial elections would have impacted on delivery timeframes and ability to complete the project in the required timeframes.

3. TENDER REVIEW VP389489 PURCHASE OF HEAVY PLANT AND MACHINERY EQUIPMENT

In August 2023, the Hon Stirling Hinchcliffe (Minister for Tourism Innovation & Sport at that time) announced funding to Council to purchase plant and equipment for Council's waste transfer strategies.

Management of Council and Department of Environment and Science (DESI) (the funding body) agreed on scope of equipment, which went to tender on 8 November 2023 and closed on 29 November 2023.

Council continued discussions with DESI due to their continued changes to the scope of equipment to be funded. DESI were informed that ongoing delays may impact on quoted prices (valid for 3 months).

In January 2024, DESI verbally advised that the agreement for the release of funding would be forthcoming. To allow timely purchase of the plant and equipment, a resolution was sought from Council to allow this action once funding was available.

Any delays in seeking Ministerial approval or waiting for the appointment of the new Council following the quadrennial elections may have impacted on suppliers not holding the prices quoted for this equipment.

All the above actions were in accordance with the legislative responsibilities of the duly elected Council at that time.

We noted during our review of Council meeting minutes, that minutes of the meeting held on 17 May 2023 were not available on Council's website as at 31 May 2023. Local Government Regulation 2012 section 254F(6) requires minutes to be made publicly available within 10 days of the meeting.

Update 2024: We noted during our review of Council meeting minutes, that minutes of the meeting held in November 2023, December 2023 and January 2024 were not available on Council's website as at the date of our review on 13 February 2024. These have since been uploaded.

Further, minutes of a special meeting on 24 January 2024 were not uploaded to the website at date of audit review 10 May 2024.

Council is currently up to date as at the date of this letter aside from the special meeting minutes from 24 January 2024.

The Queensland Government is committed to building a digital economy, particularly for First Nations communities. As part of the Queensland Government (Department of Environment, Science and Innovation and the Department of Transport), Tafe Queensland and the Federal Government's (Department of Employment and Workplace Relations) financial commitment to Wugu Nyambil Ltd to provide support for employment and self- employment creation, Yarrabah is now able to offer greater economic opportunity for its' community members. Digital Service Centres have been established with the support of local councils on Palm Island, in Cherbourg and in Jumbin.

As part of the Queensland Government (Department of Environment, Science and Innovation and the Department of Transport), Tafe Queensland and the Federal Government's (Department of Employment and Workplace Relations) financial commitment to Wugu Nyambil Ltd to provide support for employment and self-employment creation, Yarrabah is now able to offer greater economic opportunity for its' community members. The commencement of the centre will create between 15 to 20 jobs in Yarrabah.

A Digital Service Centre is a business model that delivers commercial digital services to a third-party fee-paying client which could be corporate or government.

It provides a culturally safe place that delivers tailored digital training, upskilling and employment opportunities to local people and builds community confidence, capacity and capability.

Request

Wugu Nyambil Ltd has signed deeds and agreements with state and federal government agencies mentioned above, to commence the Digital Service Centre in June 2024. Wugu Nyambil Ltd has recently sought the verbal support from Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council to provide Training Room 1 and 2 of the RTC Building to enter into a commercial lease and commence fit out requirements.

We would like to respectfully request approval to have these rooms converted to commercial tenancy so we can enter into a lease agreement of Training Room 1 and 2 as soon as possible.

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The government partners will be able to support with the latest internet connectivity for this project. An advantage to council for offering us a lease agreement is that as part of our intended fit out we would significantly be increasing the asset value of the building.

The operations of the Digital Services Centre would have no imposition to the council and we view this as an advantage to the community and other stakeholders that the Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council would be seen to be actively supporting community and economic development by creating local jobs.
