- b) For purchases between \$50.01 (GST exclusive) and 1,999.99 (GST exclusive), one verbal quotation is sufficient. A written record of quotations received must be made. Purchases must be made by placing a written purchase order or by purchasing card. (Schedule 1 identifies the holders of corporate purchasing cards issued by Council.)
- c) For Building Services purchases up to the value of \$4,999.99 (GST exclusive) may be approved without seeking written quotations, provided sound contracting principles and Local Government principles (including reasonableness, transparency and governance) are maintained. A written record of quotations must be made.
- d) For Departmental purchases (excluding Building Services) between \$2000.00 (GST exclusive) and 4,999.99 (GST exclusive), one written quotation is sufficient. Purchases must be made by placing a written purchase order.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To report to Council proposed options for Annual Closure during Christmas & Festive Season – 2024.

BACKGROUND

Under the provisions of clause 19 of the Queensland Local Government Industry (Streams A, B & C) Award – State 2017, there is a legislative requirement to provide employees with 90 days' notice of the annual close down period.

The period has normally been set aside as "family" time for staff. Essential staff are employed during the period as a skeleton crew, with approved leave deferred until a later (agreeable) date.

COMMENT

Council's position previously has required employees to take annual leave on days that are not designated public holidays for the Christmas/New Year period. This is the recommendation for the 2024 Christmas and Festive Season.

In 2024, Christmas and New Year's Days fall on weekends and under the provisions of the *Holiday Act 1983*, the following have been gazetted as the public holidays:-

- Wednesday 25th December 2024 Christmas Day
- Thursday 26th December 2024 Boxing Day
- Wednesday 1st January 2025 -New Year's Day

This will require Stream A employees to apply for 7.5 (5 full and 3 half) days and Stream B & C employees to apply for 6 days annual leave.

CONSIDERATIONS

Council has supported declaring "Council Shutdown" days as paid days (especially for our casual employees).

Council currently employs <u>40 casual workers</u> (31 % of workforce), who do not have provisions for accrual of any annual leave or payment for public holidays. As a result, these employees will not be in receipt of any income during the annual closedown and will be financially impacted during this period.

Council may wish to consider the payment to <u>all employees</u> for days declared as paid "Council Shutdown" days.

In previous years the following has been endorsed by council:

- Council resolved for 1 x day "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2018 shutdown period.
- Council resolved for 2 x days "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2019 shutdown period.
- Council resolved for 2 x days "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2020 shutdown period.
- Council resolved for 2 x days "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2021 shutdown period.
- Council resolved for 1 x days "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2022 shutdown period.
- Council resolved for 1 x days "Council Shutdown" paid for the 2023 shutdown period.

Projected cost:

It is estimated for the 2024 period, if Council resolves to provide for a paid "Council Shutdown" day, it will incur a <u>wage cost of approximately \$31,350 (gross) per day.</u>

The Post Office is required to remain open on all days not gazetted as public holidays. One other day during this period will be determined by postal services to be closed. This date is yet to be determined. The Director – Corporate Services will arrange for rostering of a staff member to cover this period.

A skeleton crew consisting of staff from Essential Services is maintained during the closedown period to check / maintain water quality and testing. Waste collection is rostered on for normal collection days. The Director – Infrastructure will arrange rostering of necessary staff to cover this period.

On -call system to be implemented for urgent housing/building maintenance. Director - Building Services will arrange rostering of on-call staff.

- During the month of AUGUST the YASC housing team has continued the approach of house visits conducted to recover rental arrears.
- 16 Centrepay deduction authority forms have been completed to address rent and arrears.
- \$12,268.61 have been recovered in additional rent arrears payments for the month.

2. EARLY LEARNING CENTRE (DAYCARE)

The Day Care Centre has experienced a slight decrease in enrolments, which we believe is related to the ongoing collection of outstanding fees. Currently, there are 15 vacant positions, particularly in the Nursery and Junior Kindy rooms. Additionally, we have advertised for the Assistant Manager's position and are awaiting the outcome of the recruitment process.

At present, there are two vacant positions within the centre: one Group Leader and one Inclusion Support person. Furthermore, our Cook will be going on maternity leave next month, creating another vacancy.

The Health and Wellbeing team from Queensland has been regularly checking our two Foodcubes. However, the current crops are deteriorating due to strong winds and the end of the growing season. The children thoroughly enjoyed observing the vegetables grow, and we plan to start the spring crops soon.

Gurriny Health continues to visit the centre every Wednesday as part of their "Dolly Dolls" program, which focuses on teaching good hygiene practices. The children are enjoying the program immensely.

We have updated Inclusion Support Queensland, and we are hopeful that our claim for payment will be processed in the coming weeks.

The 2023-2024 Financial Acquittal for the Community Child Care Restricted (CCCFR) Fund is due on 31st October.

Letters to parents and carers will be sent out this week regarding overdue fees exceeding \$500. While all parents are expected to maintain a credit balance of at least two weeks, some outstanding invoices have once again reached significant amounts. It is important to remind families that we are not a free service, and regular payment of fees is essential.

4. YARRABAH ARTS AND CULTURAL PRECINCT

The Yarrabah Arts and Cultural Precinct (YACP) remains a vibrant cornerstone of our community, dedicated to preserving and promoting the rich cultural heritage of Yarrabah. Since 1 July 2024, we have engaged with 78 patrons, with 46 visiting in the current month. Our sales figures reflect the economic potential of our arts sector, with year-to-date sales reaching \$28,545 and month-to-date sales at \$17,065. These figures underscore the increasing local and external interest in Yarrabah's arts and cultural initiatives

Events, Projects, and Art Awards

Darwin Aboriginal Art Fair & National Indigenous Fashion Awards (NIFA)

YACP artists Philomena Yeatman and Michelle Yeatman, accompanied by the Manager, represented Yarrabah at this prestigious event. Philomena won the NIFA Traditional Adornment category, while Simone Arnol took home the Fashion Designer award. These accolades have significantly boosted our profile, with media coverage from Vogue Australia, NITV, National

Indigenous Times, SBS, ABC, Sydney Morning Herald, Women's Weekly, QLD Weekender, and Rag Traders.

Louise Joel Gallery and Hobson Bay Council Exhibition

The "Charcoal" exhibition is set to launch on 16 November. Our Manager and a YACP artist will attend for the installation and an artist talk.

North Queensland Ceramic Awards

Philomena Yeatman is a finalist in this competition, with a chance to win the \$10,000 prize, enhancing both our artistic reputation and financial opportunities.

Crystal Brook Collection - Bailey Exhibition

Scheduled for December 2024 to January 2025, this exhibition coincides with peak tourist season, presenting significant sales prospects.

Work Experience and Educational Engagements

Three students from Yarrabah High School have commenced work experience with YACP, ensuring the transfer of cultural knowledge and professional development to future generations.

Commissioned Projects

7. WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

Safety Induction

Daycare safety inductions were conducted on 3rd August 2024 at the Daycare Centre. A total of 10 council employees from the Daycare successfully completed the induction. Due to staff-to-child ratios, three separate sessions were held to ensure all staff participated.

LGW Safety Audit

The Safety Audit was conducted over three days by LGW auditors, focusing on compliance with our Safety Management System. The first day involved interviews with all Directors and the Safety Officer. On the second day, auditors conducted a walkthrough of Council work sites. We await the formal results of this audit.

Asbestos Audit

During the closing meeting, the auditor emphasised the need for an Asbestos Register for all council buildings constructed before 2003, which includes over 40 properties.

Safety Committee

A Safety Committee meeting will be scheduled in the coming days. The recent Safety Audit caused a delay, but we aim to hold the meeting next week.

Test and Tagging

We have almost completed the Test and Tagging for all industrial areas of the Works Department. We have received a quote for a second Test and Tag device, which should improve the efficiency and speed of the process moving forward.

Security

Over the past month, there has been an increase in vandalism and damage to council property, particularly at the Yarrabah Beach Road work site, where bricks were smashed. Security patrols have been increased, and names of suspects have been forwarded to the Director based on logs from the security team.

On 31st August 2024, Safety Officer received a call from the security team about a fire at the Museum Barn Shed. Upon arrival, we found ride-on mowers burning inside the shed. With help from Rural Fire Yarrabah and the Yarrabah Police, the fire was extinguished, and the mowers were removed from the shed. The incident reported to Police.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To report to Council the status/activities of Building Services areas for the months of August - September 2024

BACKGROUND

The focus for the Building Services Department over this period has been:

- Physical completion & Closure of HH1 work orders with invoice to QBuild.
- A big effort has been made recently to reduce numbers of aged work orders and the aged report is just starting to show this. Many more work order invoices were received by QBuild yesterday which would not have made it into the latest report, so actual numbers are lower than reported.
- Implemented new quoting spreadsheet to capture true costs and ensure correct margins. Already 60+ quotations created with this spreadsheet. Errors appeared to have reduced to zero and time for creation of each quotation has reduced from average of 25 minutes down to 3-4 minutes. Based on the above we have saved over 21 hours in last 6 weeks quoting alone. Our Administration Coordinator has even drafted a couple of quotations for me to review prior to sending to QBuild. Having admin staff able to draft quotes as well as Henry, Bill and I will allow for quicker responses and less delays.
- Implemented a new job card calculation spreadsheet which is aimed at minimising errors, saving time and maximising profit. Administration of job card invoice preparation is now simpler and quicker. All staff using it have given it their approval.
- Organising tool kits for our carpenters so they can be effective out in the field. These tool
 kits are to be each carpenter's responsibility to look after and maintain. Request for POs to
 Cairns Hardware have been made and the tools kits are now ready to deliver once POs are
 received.
- Healthy Housing round 2 is getting much more organised now which should start to see this program progress quicker and this will no doubt please all in the HH team and hierarchy

Other actions in progress are:

A separate fencing program – Properties to be identified by QBuild and Housing with council input. Currently our carpenters are installing the fencing at 14 Smith Street as well as a myriad of other repairs throughout the community. We are planning on building up a specialised team for predominately fencing projects.

A separate garden shed program – A meeting was held on 5th September between Housing, QBuild and myself to outline how this would look and nominate standards for garden shed installs.

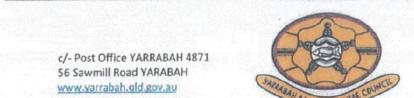

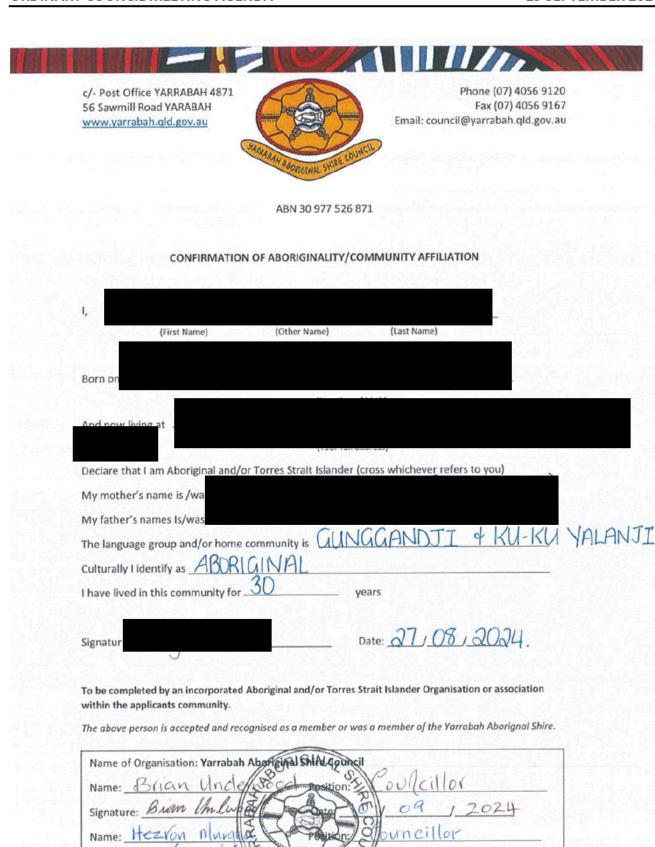
