Council's Operating result is a loss of \$2.740M as at 30 April 2025, better than budget by \$4.092M.

Recurrent income is over budget by \$3.431M. Grants & subsidies are over budget by \$2.302M a result of the ICFP funding being higher than was budgeted. The increased ICFP funding has helped reduce the operating loss year to date.

Recurrent expenditure is \$660K under budget. Finance costs are under budget by \$447K, with Employee costs and Materials and Services being under budget by 293K and 78K respectively. However, it should be also noted the bad debts impairment is not calculated until the end of financial year and traditionally are between \$300-500k.

Housing Planned Maintenance net profit exceeded the yearly budget already by \$799K with continued strong growth of the QBuild maintenance business.

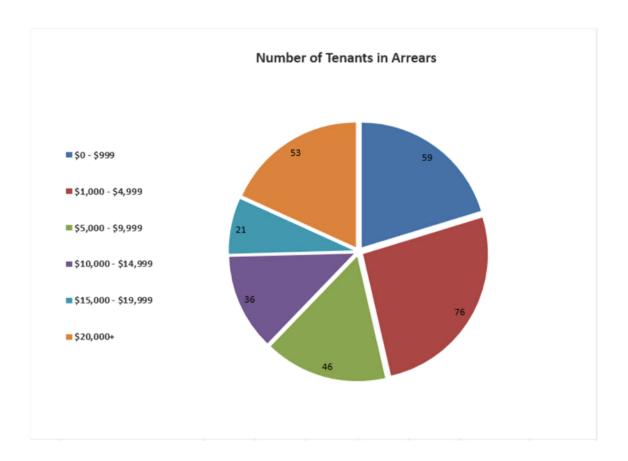
Over the past 12 months, the rental arrears to Council for social housing has increased by \$314,590 (11%) from \$2,922,907 to \$3,237,497. A review of debtors has highlighted the following:

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To seek Council endorsement for support of the draft proposed Education Precinct Strategic Master Plans and Discrete Communities Renewal Concept Plans.

BACKGROUND

The Department of Education (DOE) have provided to Council information relating to the building condition of the current campuses and needs for the growing school population in Yarrabah. This information has been workshopped with Councillors and a draft proposal developed.

COMMENT

Council identifies the immediate needs for students attending school at Yarrabah and the current conditions of existing facilities and has indicated its support in remedial actions by the Department to address these issues.

Council maintains its position that a new P -12 campus on land put aside for this purpose in the new "Balamba estate".

Any additional structures, as proposed by DOE requires Council to consider a lease for additional land, currently earmarked for an extension to the Yarrabah Town Centre (subject to ongoing funding applications).

In discussions with DOE, Council has maintained its position that, pending appropriate community consultation, any future lease application for additional land would be subject to conditions, limited to a 5 year period and a further condition that Council may cancel this lease with written notice, such leased land to be vacated within 12 months of that date.

CONSULTATION

To date, DOE has only workshopped this plan with Council. Council has indicated to DOE that community consultation is required prior to any formal application to Council for leasing arrangements for the land required, as per plan.

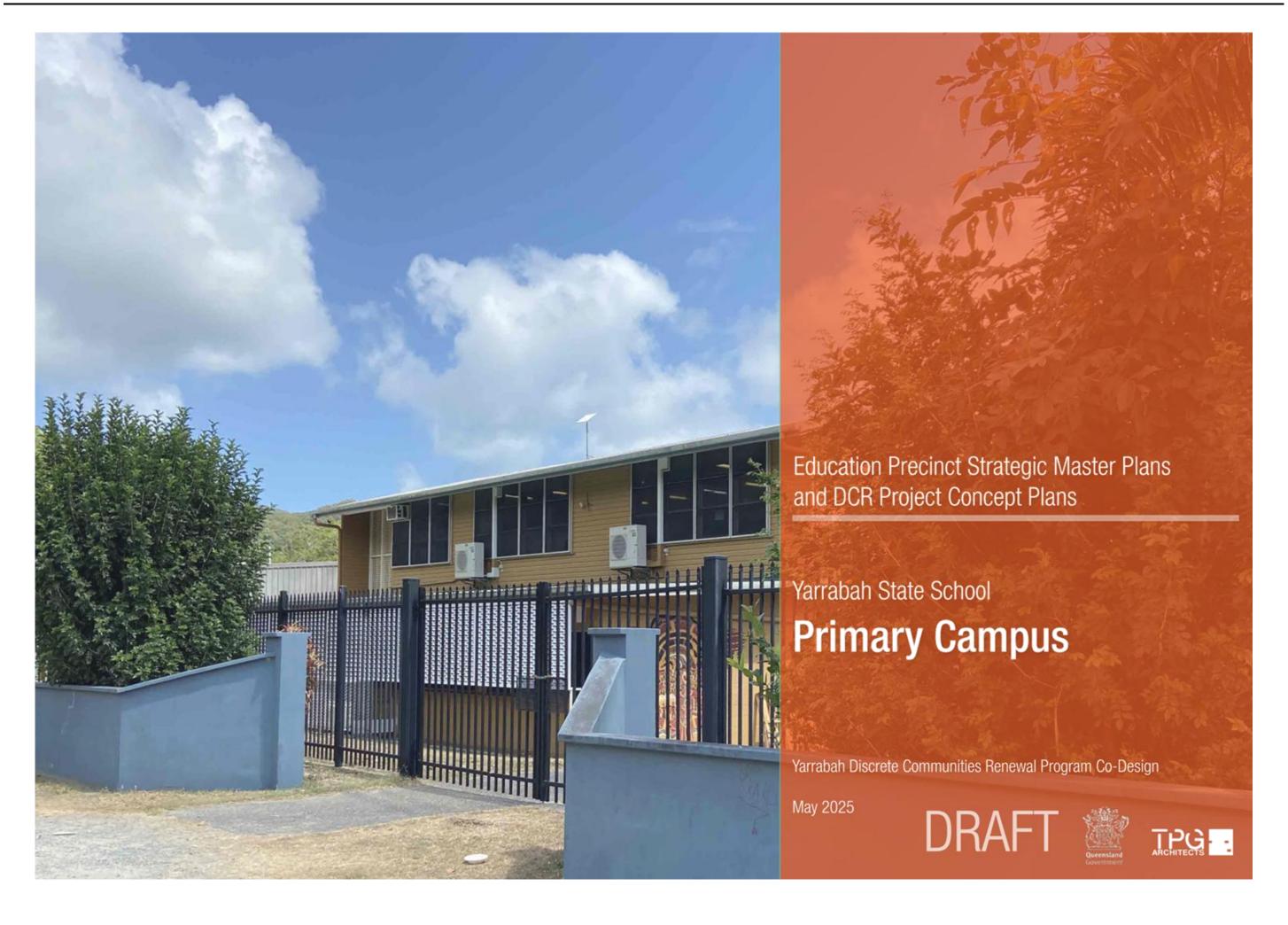

- Response submitted without a Schedule of Rates a follow-up request was issued by Council on the 26th of April with a response received on Thursday 1st May.
- On receipt of the Schedule of Rates, the supplier revised their total pricing to \$319,384.30 excl. GST –

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council was successful in its submission for Reef Guardian funding for the removal and disposal of sludge from the wastewater treatment lagoons (Reef Guardian Grant – ALCRAP000060). The project involves removal of the wastewater sludges from the primary lagoon, on site processing to reduce the moisture content, followed by transportation and disposal at an appropriate disposal facility. This is a critical project as the lagoons have not had any sludge removed since their construction in the late 1990's. The amount of sludge present in the lagoons is preventing installation of the surface aeration system and is therefore impacting the capacity and performance of the treatment system.

Council released a Request for Tender to the open market via VendorPanel on 5th July 2024. At tender close on 6th August 2024, 6 tender submissions had been received. In addition to the tenders, YASC utilised the FNQROC Regional Biosolids contract rates as a 7th submission. The submissions were circulated to the evaluation panel members and an evaluation meeting was held 16th October 2024. The evaluation panel consisted of:

Pricing provided in the table below is an estimate based on a combination of lump sum mobilisation/demobilisation charges and the tenderers quoted rates for extraction, dewatering, transport and disposal of the sludge based. The amount of sludge to be removed from the lagoons has been estimated by inspection and testing undertaken by YASC.

Arkwood's overall weighted score (non-price) of 6.93 (from a maximum available score of 10) indicates that the tenderer has the capacity, resources and experience to successfully deliver the project outcome (see Report Section 4.2-4.6). The panel agrees that the proposal demonstrates value for money (see Report Section 4.7).

Based on a conservative estimate of the sludge volume in the lagoon, all tendered prices were in excess of the current approved funding under the Reef Guardian program which has prohibited award of the contract in 2024. Council sought additional funding from a number of streams including further funding from the Reef Guardian program and the Housing Support Package Critical Enabling Infrastructure fund (HSP CEI). Given the dependencies between the aeration, switchboard and de-sludging projects, Council is seeking an amalgamation of both projects to enable combination of budgets and resolve any concerns with respect to packaging the switchboard component with aeration tender. Negotiations are ongoing with Reef Guardian; however, due to the need to complete dewatering before the onset of the wet season and to secure contractor availability, it is proposed that the lagoon dewatering tender be awarded immediately for a value below the current approved and available lagoon dewatering grant funding. This will allow the contractor to lock in the Yarrabah project into its schedule for later this year and will allow removal of a significant proportion, if not all of the sludge from the lagoon.

The contract will comprise of a lump sum fee of \$330,060 ex GST for the fixed mobilisation and demobilisation costs and the charges associated with processing the estimated 9,000 kL of sludge and water. This lump sum also includes the estimated disposal cost for 250 wet tonnes of solids and 50 blockage events during processing.

The evaluation panel members recommend to the Yarrabah Aboriginal Council that the tender from Arkwood Organic Recycling be accepted for \$330,060 ex GST.

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1. PROJECT DETAILS

1.1. Aim and Description

Yarrabah is an Aboriginal community located approximately 12km east of Cairns. By road, the coastal community is 60km from the Cairns central business district (CBD). The location of the wastewater treatment lagoons and project site are provided in the image below.

Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council (YASC) is seeking to improve the performance of the wastewater treatment lagoons by removing accumulated sludge from the primary lagoon. As this task has not been undertaken since the lagoon were constructed, removal of the sludge will result in capacity and quality improvements.



1.2. Scope of Work

The scope of the Wastewater Lagoon Sludge Removal and Disposal project includes:

- Engagement and mobilisation of a suitably qualified and experienced contractor;
- Mixing (or dredging), pumping and where required, screening of lagoon solids;
- Mechanical or polymer assisted dewatering of the lagoon solids to the lowest possible moisture content;
- Transportation and disposal of the solids at an appropriately licenced facility.

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2. TENDER PROCESS

2.1. Request For Tender

The tender documentation was issued to the open market on the VendorPanel platform on Friday 5th July 2024 with a closing date and time of 4.00pm Tuesday 6th August 2024. The invitation requested the quote to be valid for 90 days. Consequently, the validity period expired on Monday 4th November 2024.

2.2. Tender Briefings/Site Inspections

A non-compulsory tender briefing was held at the project site on Friday 19th July 2024. 5 companies were attended the tender briefing.

2.3. Addenda and Information Documents

During the tender period a number of questions were posed by prospective tenderers and subsequently responded to by YASC. This process was undertaken within the VendorPanel online platform. In addition, two addenda were issued that provided additional guidance to tenderers on the quality and quantity of the sludge in the lagoon.

2.4. Tender Receipt and Opening

At the tender closing date six tender submissions were received. The submissions were forwarded to Tender Assessment Panel Members on the 14th August 2024. Arkwood Organic Recycling are the current FNQROC Regional Biosolids contractor and their rates were also used in the assessment. Council Officers were very pleased with the number of responses to the tender and feel confident that market capability and rates have been adequately tested by the open tender process.

3. TENDER ASSESSMENT

3.1. Tender Assessment Panel Members

A tender evaluation meeting was held Wednesday 16th October 2024. All panel members attended the meeting with Clayton Abreu from UNGANCO joining as an independent observer.

Although panel members are all part of the water industry as Council Officers or consultants, no members had conflicts of interest to declare.

3.2. Tender Assessment Procedure

Individual Assessments

The Procurement Administrator shared the following documentation with the tender assessment panel prior to the evaluation meeting:

All documents included in the tender request;

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Wastewater Lagoon Sludge Removal and Dewatering - Tender Evaluation Report

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- Probity and Evaluation Plan; and
- The Tender submission.

The Probity and Evaluation Plan consisted of the principles of probity which all panels members understood and accepted.

The Evaluation Template was provided for notes and scoring and listed the evaluation criteria as listed in the tender briefing. A Scoring Table was included to provide guidance on scoring.

Group Assessment

The Panel Members discussed their individual assessments and scores in an MS Teams meeting on 16th October 2024. The Panel then discussed the pricing and whether the tender provided Value For Money.

4. DETAILED EVALUATION

4.1. Evaluation Criteria and Weighting

The panel commenced a detailed assessment of the tender by discussing the panel members' individual weighted scores for each criterion. These criteria are shown in Table 2.

4.2. Work Procedures and Methodology (30%)

The panel members discussion and written comments are summarised as follows:

Tenderer: Catchment Solutions

- Proposal is to remove solids by floating dredge, pumped through a screen and macerator followed by mechanical dewatering using a screw press.
- Misting cannons have been proposed to assist with odour management.
- The solids are proposed to be stockpiled on site while testing is carried out.
- A project scope analysis was provided to assist in defining contractor and principal responsibilities.

Tenderer: Desilting Solutions

- Proposal is to remove solids by floating dredge, pumped through a screen followed by mechanical dewatering using a centrifuge.
- Tenderer demonstrated very good appreciation of the scope and risks associated with the works.
- Polymer and centrifuge operation will be managed continuously to maximise dryness.

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Tenderer: Desludging Solutions

- Proposal is to remove solids by floating dredge, pumped through a screen followed by mechanical dewatering using a centrifuge.
- Good appreciation of the required scope and identified strategies to manage risks (sludge sampling for polymer selection, controllable dredge and auger to support effective dewatering, balance tank for sludge feed control)

Tenderer: Hando's Tanker Hire

- Provided 3 different options for removal and dewatering of the lagoon solids. Considerable thought and effort have gone into the development of the various methodologies.
- Mechanical dewatering option involves draining the supernatant from the lagoon, pumping through and drum screen into a screw press for dewatering.

Tenderer: SNG Engineering

- The proposed methodology is removal of all water and solids simultaneously via vacuum tanker. No dewatering is proposed prior to transport out of Yarrabah.
- The level of detail provided is not sufficient to fully understand how the project outcome will be achieved.

Tenderer: Wastewater Works

- Proposal is to remove solids by floating pontoon with pump with dewatering via screw press. Both screening and unscreened has been proposed.
- The submission lacked some detail on the proposed methodology however technical information regarding the screw press system was provided.

Tenderer: Arkwood Organic Recycling

- Proposal is to remove solids by mixing the lagoon and pumping through a centrifuge for dewatering.
- The same methodology used annually at Gordonvale WWTP will be implemented at Yarrabah. A
 member of the evaluation panel has had significant first-hand experience with the annual dewatering
 of the Gordonvale lagoons.
- To reduce impact on community and cost, Arkwood have proposed a morning and afternoon shift however trucks will not run after hours.

The panel scores for Work Procedures and Methodology are as per Table 3.

4.3. Assessment of Key Personnel (20%)

The panel members discussion and written comments are summarised as follows:

Tenderer: Catchment Solutions

- Catchment Solutions are collaborating with Macquarie Environmental as they have done on previous projects.
- Team consists of environmental scientists, wastewater operators and civil contractor personnel.

Tenderer: Desilting Solutions

- Project Manager is a civil engineer and has significant experience in sludge removal and project management. The site supervisor has a trade background with several relevant certificate qualifications. An environmental specialist forms part of the team.
- The key staff proposed have used the proposed centrifuge previously with over 60,000m3 processed.

Tenderer: Desludging Solutions

- Project Manager proposed is also the business owner for the past 14 years.
- Supervisor has trade background with 15yrs + dewatering experience. General hand previously worked for Conhur and has 5yrs dewatering experience.

Tenderer: Hando's Tanker Hire

- Very experience team with key role holders having 15+ yrs experience.
- Organisational chart and back up staff options provided.

Tenderer: SNG Engineering

 The proposed team has water and wastewater experience however there was no reference made to direct experience with sludge removal and dewatering.

Tenderer: Wastewater Works

- No personnel details were provided with the tender submission.

Tenderer: Arkwood Organic Recycling

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- Personnel who have been successfully completing the FNQROC biosolids contract for the past 8
 years will be managing and completing the works.
- Staff are very familiar with far north Queensland site conditions, roads and disposal facility.

4.4. Experience and Track Record (Contractor and Equipment) (25%)

- Reference projects are heavily focussed on contaminated land with some biosolids sampling but not dewatering.

Tenderer: Desilting Solutions

 Desilting Solutions are currently engaged to dewater lagoons in Dunedoo. Previous experience at Rockhampton lagoon STP's.

Tenderer: Desludging Solutions

 Currently undertaking dewatering of lagoons in NSW. Previous relevant experience in NT, Merriwa NSW and Sydney Water.

Tenderer: Hando's Tanker Hire

- Very experience team with key role holders having 15+ yrs experience. Tenterfield and Central Highlands Regional Council. Currently working for Urban Utilities.
- Organisational chart and back up staff options provided.

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Wastewater Lagoon Sludge Removal and Dewatering - Tender Evaluation Report

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Tenderer: SNG Engineering

 The proposed team has water and wastewater design and construction experience however the proposal did not highlight any relevant sludge removal and dewatering projects.

Tenderer: Wastewater Works

 The rehabilitation of Townsville Correctional centre lagoons was tabled as a reference project however there was not enough detail to determine how relevant this work is to the Yarrabah project.

Tenderer: Arkwood Organic Recycling

- Arkwood complete a lagoon dewatering process annually at Gordonvale. This has been ongoing for 8 years.
- Arkwood are a highly experienced biosolids management contractor.

The panel scores for Experience and Track Record (Contractor and Equipment) are as per Table 5.

4.5. Program of Works (20%)

At the time of the tender, Council was working hard to meet the Reef Guardian grant funding deadline for completion of these works by 31 January 2025. With this date falling in the height of the north Queensland wet season, a 20% weighting was applied to highlight the importance of meeting the required timeframe to tenderers. All tenders received indicated that they could deliver the works if the project was awarded within a month of tender close. Once tenders were evaluated, it was clear that additional funds are required and therefore the likelihood of meeting the funding deadline greatly reduced. As a result, Council has met with the Reef Guardian Program Manager to determine whether an extension of time would be supported. Reef Guardian have indicated that they would approve an extension of time through a project variation process which would see the lagoon aeration project and desludging project amalgamated.

Given the change of circumstances with respect to project timing and the importance of completing the works prior to the wet season, the panel elected to score all tenderers as acceptable (a score of 5), effectively negating the impact of the program on the overall evaluation.

4.6. Business Profile (Local, Social, Sustainability, Participation) (5%)

The business profile criteria is reviewed and scored by the evaluation panel simultaneously given the nature of the assessment. There is limited scope of personal interpretation and opinion as the criteria is quite prescriptive. The assessment is based on:

- Whether the tenderer has a local office or depot withing the Council boundaries.
- Whether they employ local staff.
- The proportion of work undertaken by local in the Yarrabah and Cairns region.
- Environmental and health and safety track record.
- Utilisation of local suppliers and supply chains.
- Whether the tenderer supports local community groups, charities, sporting team and social enterprises.

The panel members discussion and written comments are summarised as follows:

Tenderer: Catchment Solutions, Desludging Solutions, Hando's Tanker Hire, SNG Engineering, Wastewater Works, Arkwood Organic Recycling

- These tenderers all provided confirmation of a good environmental and safety track record
- These tenderers provided evidence of supporting suppliers and supply change local to the Cairns region

Tenderer: Desilting Solutions

- Desilting Solutions provided evidence of good environmental and safety track record and evidence of local supply chain support.
- Desilting Solutions stated that they would engage Yarrabah locals by partnering with local labour hire for the dewatering period.

4.7. Value for Money Assessment

Establishing lump sum pricing for this tender is extremely challenging given the variables involved. As the lagoons have not been emptied for over 20 years, it is difficult to confirm the volume and consistency of the solids below the lagoon surface. As the cost of disposal is directly proportional to the weight of solids delivered to the disposal site, the effectiveness of the mechanical dewatering equipment significantly impacts the disposal cost. The effectiveness of the dewatering equipment will vary over the course of the project as the solids consistency and quality varies as the lagoon empties. The effectiveness also varies based on the dewatering technology selected, the coagulation polymer chosen and the skill of the dredge and dewatering equipment operator.

In order to provide a basis for assessment, Council requested pricing be provided as a schedule of rates from where the mobilisation and demobilisation costs (fixed costs), were separated from the variable costs (volumetric processing rate $(\$/m^3)$ and disposal rate (\$/t)).

In order to understand how the various rates impact the total project completion costs, Council assigned a standard volume to be removed from the lagoon and assigned a standard tonnage for disposal. With respect to the processing charge, for tenderers who intended to utilise dredging, 2000m³ was adopted, and for those emptying the entire lagoon, 9000m³ was adopted. With respect to disposal, in all cases the tonnage of sludge to be disposed was assigned at 800t.

In terms of overall value for money, the panel members reviewed the non-price criteria assessments and scoring in conjunction with the schedule of rates and estimated forecast cost to establish a rating.

The only tenderer which was considered to represent 'good' value for money was Arkwood Organic Recycling. All other tenderers were either considered 'medium' or 'low'.

As per the evaluation rating criteria, an overall score of 6.93 represents an 'Acceptable' to 'Good' offer which satisfies the requirements of the tender with minor additional benefits, has provided an above average response which exceeds Council's expectations in relation to the relevant criterion, and sufficient supporting evidence has been provided.

This overall technical score combined with an overall demonstrated value for money, demonstrates that Arkwood Organic Recycling has the capability and resources to complete the project to the required standard.

5. FUNDS AVAILABILITY

There are two approved grants that relate to this project:

- ALCRAP000012 Installation of Surface Aeration System (\$210,000)
- ALCRAP000060 Sewage Treatment Plant Upgrade (\$510,000)

Based on the approved scopes, the cost of the desludging is covered by ALCRAP000060. Unfortunately, ALCRAP00060 must also provide funds for the electrical switchboard necessary to enable aeration upgrade. In order to allocate more funding to dewatering and disposal of sludge, an application was made to the State Government to waive the landfill disposal levy (\$90k). Council has been advised that the request for an exemption has been approved enabling award of a contract. In order ensure that we have the greatest chance removing all sludge from the lagoon, negotiations with the Reef Guardian program managers to secure additional funding is ongoing.

To secure Arkwood services this year prior to the onset of the wet season, the contract award sum will be comprised of the fixed mobilisation and demobilisation costs, the volumetric charge to process the entire lagoon volume with an allowance to transport and dispose of 250t wet tonnes of sludge. The actual amount of sludge present in the lagoon and the contractors ability to process and transport it, will only be fully understood once dewatering commences. This approach allows to project to commence while still leaving approved funds to complete a lagoon condition inspection, and the construction of the switchboard needed for the aeration upgrade.

6. RECOMMENDATION

The evaluation panel members recommend to the Yarrabah Aboriginal Council that the tender from Arkwood Organic Recycling be accepted for \$330,060 ex GST.

2. EARLY LEARNING CENTRE (DAYCARE)

April has been a productive month, with a strong focus on finalising outstanding compliance matters with the Department of Education. We have also commenced the review and update of our 95 Daycare Operational Policies, with the goal of completing this significant body of work by the end of May. This is a substantial undertaking, essential to ensure our continued compliance with Department of Education and Early Childhood legislative requirements.

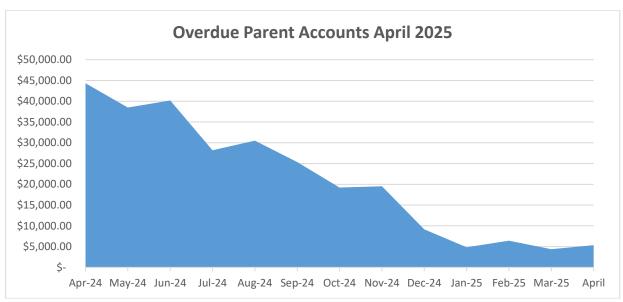
Unfortunately, staff and child absences continue to be a concern due to an outbreak of conjunctivitis within the centre. Staff and families have been advised to remain at home and seek medical advice if symptoms appear. An information sheet was promptly distributed to all parents and carers once multiple cases were confirmed.

We are pleased to announce the employment of a new qualified Group Leader who brings extensive management and leadership experience. Her background includes senior roles in long-term Daycare services outside the community. Her return to Yarrabah is a significant gain for the centre and the community. She brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise that will greatly support staff development and the implementation of best practices.

Preparations are well underway for the upcoming external excursion to the Cairns Aquarium. Risk assessments are in the final stages of completion, and appropriate child restraints have been sourced to ensure compliance with safety regulations. We plan to transport five children per session, depending on staff availability, across three mornings. A seven-seater vehicle with anchor

points has been secured. Departure is scheduled for 8:30 am, with return to Yarrabah by lunchtime. The first group is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, 18th to Friday, 20th June.

As of the end of April, outstanding parent debt totals \$5,238.24, reflecting an increase of \$952.24 compared to the previous month. This increase is primarily due to the manager being on annual leave and therefore unable to follow up on parent accounts during this period.

The three interconnected wombs represent Grandmother (Babin), Mother (Muudjun), and Daughter (Djanguul), bound by a thread symbolising the umbilical cord and the transfer of cultural knowledge through generations.

The piece honours the resilience of women and celebrates the sacred transmission of heritage.

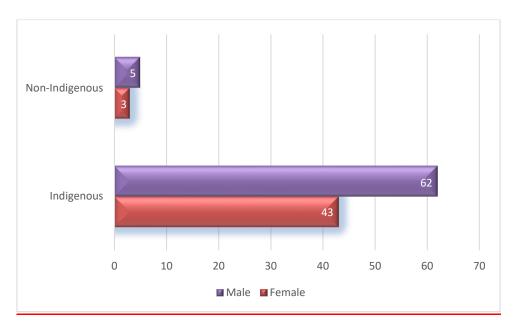








Graph for indigenous / non indigenous employees

7. WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

Safety Induction

The online safety induction program continues to be effective. We are currently exploring the integration of a voice-over option to accommodate different learning styles among both new and existing employees.

LGW Audit

The LGW audit remains ongoing. We are currently working through the identified findings. An LGW consultant is scheduled to visit Yarrabah in June for two days to work on-site with Council staff. The consultant has provided a list of audit findings that need to be addressed during her visit. This will be an important opportunity to review and align some of the audit findings with the requirements of the National Audit Tool.

Training

Refresher Health and Safety Representative (HSR) training is scheduled to commence in June for two Council employees. This will be a one-day course

Safety Committee

The next Safety Committee meeting is scheduled for 3 July 2025. The meeting date and agenda will be confirmed and circulated to committee members closer to the date.

Incidents

In April, an incident occurred at the Daycare Centre where a childcare worker sustained a lower back injury while lifting a 15-litre drum of cleaning chemical. The employee is currently on WorkCover, with time off until full recovery. A workplace assessment has been arranged through Kinnect, who provide workplace rehabilitation services for injured employees returning to normal duties. Additionally, a workplace assessment and recovery work plan have been completed for the Council storeman who recently underwent back surgery, to guide his duties and improve his working environment.

Security

April was an active month for the security team, particularly around Reeves Creek. Security officers have been conducting night patrols during the time the bus transports hospital staff to and from shifts, addressing ongoing incidents of juveniles throwing rocks at hospital workers. Situation has significantly improved since we focus on this area with no more incident reported at this stage.

Test and Tagging

The new team responsible for electrical test and tagging has performed well, with most Council areas completed. Outstanding sites include the Main Administration Building, Sports Precinct, and Yarrabah Pool, which are expected to be completed by the end of the next fortnight.

COEx Container Exchange

Most audit actions for the COEx recycling shed and associated team members have been closed out. One outstanding action remains: a hearing assessment for COEx team members during operational recycling tasks. This assessment will be scheduled accordingly.

Regulatory Updates WH&SQ

ESOLAR – electrical safety

Electrical Safety Regulations Update

As of 1 January 2025, new electrical safety regulations have come into effect in Queensland, impacting all individuals who work in or enter domestic roof spaces. Under the updated Electrical Safety Regulation 2013, power must now be switched off at the main switchboard(s) before any entry or work is undertaken in a roof space. This mandatory safety measure significantly reduces the risk of electrical incidents and enhances the overall safety of workers in such environments. Council staff and contractors involved in relevant tasks have been informed, and appropriate procedures are being reinforced to ensure compliance.
